Dear Brian,

In my dual roles as National secretary for road running in Wales and Regional Secretary for North Wales Athletics. please allow me to respond to Sheila Symonds' letter in the "autumn" edition of your magazine.

Through the good graces of the organisers of the London marathon, the Welsh marathon championships for senior men and women was included in that event, as we believe it gives the best opportunity for our runners to achieve the fastest times against the highest quality opposition. Medals are awarded to the first 3 qualifying Welsh men and women to finish and team medals for Clubs are based on the first 4 men and 3 women in each team. Should one of these athletes be over 35, we would count them as a senior and include them as such in the awarding of medals. However The Welsh Masters A.A. championships are a separate event, this year held within the "Menter Mon" marathon at Anglesey in September. Therefore, Sheila would not have been qualified as an agecategory medal winner in the Welsh senior marathon championships at London, as her age-group category was included in the Anglesey event.

Sheila is a well-known and respected figure in Welsh road running and one for whom I have the highest respect. She continues to run through a highly challenging illness and is an inspiration to all our young athletes in the Principality. Best wishes,

Masters; if you love athletics regardless of whether you are there to win or not then it is certainly for you. Please do not be under the illusion that the sport is full of athletes who never quite made the grade. Just check the W.M.A website and have a look at some of the World Records and you will see it is not the case.

I was former International athlete in Decathlon and Bobsleigh and won A.A.A. bronze medal in the Decathlon and Long jump, South of England Long jump and a World Silver medal in the Bobsleigh to name but a few.

I was inspired to make an entrance at the Masters World stage by seeing some of my friends competing and doing very well.



Indoor Pentathlon has always been a good event for me and trained for the M40 category. Further inspiration came down the line when Cristian Plaziat, a former European Decathlon Champion was in the line up for the 2008 World Champs in France. I always believed the World Record was within my reach but realised Plaziat may have other ideas.

At the champs the 1st event (60H) I won in a seasons best of 8.48, and opened up with 6.76m in the long jump. Both events would have been good enough for Gold in the individuals. However I twinged the back of my leg on my 2nd attempt in the long and had to pull out. It was very hard to carry on but on such a World stage and atmosphere I just had to. The shot produced a seasons best of 12.96 and the high jump which was the biggest surprise I managed a 1.88m clearance.

I had won four out of the five events and was awaiting the scores before the final event. They seemed very reluctant to get them. Cristian was asking my team mate how fast can I run the 1000m! I was in 1st place and needed to run 3.20 in the 1000m to break the World Record of 3976pts. I made sure I was not too far away from Cristian and came home in 3.11. A total points score of 4155pts and a new M40 World Record.

I had done it and what a great feeling. I was hoping to go out and defend the title next year but work commitments would not allow. My goal for the indoor season is to run some 60's. 200's, throw shot and have a crack at the M40 British Record for 60m hurdles.

I love the competition at the Masters and will continue to enjoy and compete as long as the old bones hold out. Anyone who thinks it will be easy please don't be disillusioned. it's highly competitive, enjoyable and you will get a lot out of it. Andy Lewis



PETER BROWNE BY Alistair Aitken

(Peter Browne was Born 3rd of February 1949 in England and his parents originally came from Wexford)

PETER BROWNE has been a remarkable middle distance runner after starting his serious athletics as a 400m runner. He won the A.A.A. 800 in 1971 in 1:47.5

He was AAA's Indoor Champion in 1975 and went on to do an M40 World Best (1:51.25) in 1990 and then in 1995 an M45 World indoor time of 1:57.32.

His life time achievements were 8m18s for 3000 at the 'Linford Christie' West London Stadium, but the others were all done at Crystal Palace.

"I used to train there three times a week" he said. Those times were 48.00 as a junior international (47.1 in the relay); 76.4-600; 1:46.2-800; 3:46.6-1500 and a 55.1-400 hurdles. One must also consider Pete Browne has loved running since he was taken on a family walk at the age of 10 and, found a grass track marked out. He asked his Father Peter to time him running round. His Father had to nearly drag him away because; he kept on asking him to do it again and again to better his time! In 2009 all those years later at 60 years of age, he managed to get inside 3 minutes indoors for the 800 (2:28.19) and jogged round the Metropolitan League cross course at Ruislip, in October, in 243rd position out of the 289 finishers as 4th over 60 runner in the race..

Looking back over the years it is easy to notice Peter had a fantastic degree of consistency as a high quality performer over two laps as a younger man, without many injuries which helped. Since then in later times as a Master he has been plagued with them.

One must point out in his years as a Master he had some high pressure and stressful jobs, particularly as an

accountant heading up a Finance team.

He also was a Southern, England and then British team Manager in the early 90's , and also takes on tasks for his club Thames Valley Harriers.

Combined with all that, with his wife Jean, he has brought up three children. Sarah born 1975; Julie 1977 and Ken in 1981 and he is also a Granddad to a little boy called Cameron. Put all that together and Peter has not had so much time to train latterly but now, he has become semi-retired and works three or four days a month and can reflect on his successful professional and athletic career and can set about helping and advising people as much as possible.

Peter Browne's wife Jean is also involved in athletics. As a young woman Jean 'Hamilton' was a sprinter for Highgate Harriers and it was at Parliament Hill Fields that she met Peter. "Highgate Harriers was a vibrant social club then with lots going on" Peter remarked. Jean was Sussex 200 Champion, a National Vets sprint Champion and then a bronze medallist in the European Masters indoors. She was Team Manager for Track & field with Parkside (Now Harrow) for 20 years. She is on the Middlesex County Committee and been their crosscountry team Manager for several years.

As a junior Pete competed for Queens Park Harriers and it was in his 40's he became a fervent member of Thames Valley Harriers. His grandfather was a sprint hurdles champion for Ireland!

Looking back to when Browne broke through as a junior. He was friends with outstanding 16/17 year old 'Superstar' John Wilson, who was trained by Charlie Elliott (Editor of Athletics Arena publications in those days). John took Peter along to see his coach and he took him on. "I had been training with the lads at QPH for a year and a half. I did not know what event I wanted to do. A bit of high jump or 200m running. Just drifting along". "There was no indication I was going to be an international. I started with Charlie and after six months I competed internationally in the first ever junior international against France". "I had only been briefly running in club races before that but by the end of the season I was ranked in the top three in my age group" Looking back he said "I believe Charlie Elliott at that stage, 40 years ago, was if not revolutionary was evolutionary and developing on others and refining techniques. A man ahead of his time"

Peter Browne was not a big mileage man, as he felt it did not suit him because when he did 80 or 90 miles it did not work for him. He found 60 to 70more suitable.

Now for his exciting life as a racer. He ran against Sebastian Coe and Steve Ovett and managed to beat Steve when he in his late teens several times but not Seb Coe. He liked both of them. Did he feel Steve Ovett would become a great athlete at the time?

"Steve Ovett was always destined for greatness and with due respect to Harry Wilson, anybody could coach Steve Ovett. He did not actually and still doesn't realise how good he was"

Peter won the Southern 800 at least 3 times and the **Middlesex Championship 800 12 times**. In 1984 Coe smashed the County record with 1:45.2. "I ran third in 1:51.0. Coe was starting to knock out World Class times on a regular basis then. Coe was a different kind of runner to Ovett. Much more technical and clinical in his approach but again, a very personable guy"

Now for a sprinkling of races from the many Browne ran.

In the AAA's 800 on 24.7.71 Peter Browne won in 1:47.5. "It was a strange kind of race. I was confident.

I knew I was in good shape. I hit the front after 400 run at a reasonable pace. We had gone through in 53-54s. There was some bumping behind me and I got shoved in the back. I was leading at the time and it propelled me forward a metre or so at the 350 mark so; this was a sign to go for it.

I kicked in fairly hard and kicked again in the home straight and held on to win by a fairly comfortable margin which was a life time PB at the time. It was quite special in many ways because it was at Crystal Palace and my family was there. A progression from the previous two years when I was 3rd then 2nd." **The European Games Final in Helsinki on the 12.8.71** was a very strong memory for Peter.

In his heat he ran 1:49.4 where he was 4th to Yevgeniy Arzhanov (SU) who won in 1:49.3.

"It was my first major international Championship. We had trained in the massive Stadium just to get a feel of the track. We came out for the heats of the 800 and that coincided with the final of the 10k.Juha Vaatainen was the great Finnish hope and went on to win that. We warmed up outside, came through the tunnel for the heats and we were totally unprepared for what was about to meet us. The stadium where we trained had become familiar when it was empty. That night we came out and stadium was jammed with screaming Finns all fired up for the 10,000. The sound was physical. We stepped on the track and virtually froze with such a shock, but I managed to recover and I qualified for the semi-finals (*On the 11th of August won by Dieter Fromm of East Germany in 1:48.6 and Peter Browne 3rd in 1:49.0*).

In the Final (*The first 6 out of the 8 were 1, Yevgeniy* Arzhanov 1:45.6, 2 Dieter Fromm 1:46.0; 3 Andy Carter (GB) 1:46.2; 4 Hans-Henning Ohlert (EG) '1:46.95; 5 Pete Browne 1:47.0; 6 Jozef Plachy (Cze) 1:47.3.)

"It was a fast race and I was still in the race with 100 metres to go but I had not got anything to respond when the 'Big Boys' kicked in the straight but it was the most painful experience. We walked to the side of the track where our kit was. I sat down on the bench and could not move. My hamstrings were on fire. It took half an hour before I could stand and walk back" In 1974 Steve Ovett won the AAA's Final in 1:46.09 from Pete

Browne (1:46.43) but Peter was impeded in the race but did not complain.

In 1989 Pete Browne ran in the World Masters 800 M40 Final in Eugene, Oregon and had a very close race with two other good British Masters Ron Bell and Les Duffy. Browne won in 1:55.2 from Bell and Duffy.

"It was a mission. My Father had just died. He was always very supportive of me. It was just before my 40th birthday in January that happened. I wanted to do something to make him proud. Ron Bell had 800/1500 M40 World records.

It was the first big Masters Championship I had been to. It was a wet day so it was described as three spitfires coming out of the clouds."

In 1990 in Budapest, Pete Browne, won three individual M40 gold medals. 400 51.56, 800 1:57.59; 1500 4:07.33--In the latter the 2nd and 3rd were Trevor Alderdice and John Potts.

"1500 was never my best as my life time best was 3:46. Because of the programme in Budapest I was able to do all three. The 1500 was obviously the hardest because it was the top of my range."

Peter sums up with a little of his philosophy on life at the age of 60. "It is the age of reflection and you realise what is important in life. What achievements actually mean. Sometimes they are important and sometimes not quite as important as they appear to be at the time. You start to reflect on how your life has gone and what experiences you have had. You realise that life is making the most of your abilities. Not doing things that are destructive or detrimental to others and how important relationships are to both family and friends."

Perhaps I 'am older (or more cynical) but I ,certainly , wasn't convinced the B.B.C team gave us "a week of entertainment of the highest order".

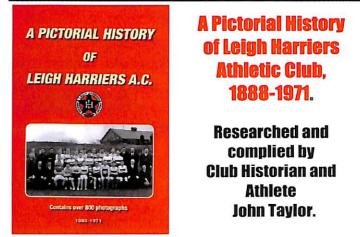
No one can dispute the background of all involved but there's just too much of a jobs for the boys (and girls) scenario here.

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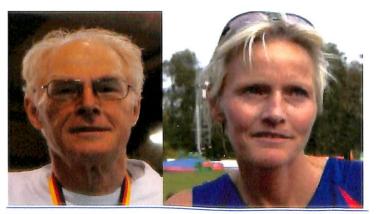

CHAIRMAN's REPORT Arthur Kimber

On the road athletes have competed in BMAF championships. Planning for the future and following our meeting with the London Development Agency, Maurice Doogan, Phil Bell and I met officers from Visit London, Jennifer Butler, Karen Webb and Ian Edmundson, to present our proposals for bidding for the W.M.A championships in the Olympic stadium in 2015. Also Maurice Doogan and Brian Owen had a very encouraging meeting with Steve Hollingworth from Birmingham City Council to discuss the possibility of holding the W.M.A indoor championships at the N.I.A in 2014.

The next major competitions begin early in the New Year, the first indoor fixture at Lee Valley, our Pentathlon Championship, in January, the W.M.A Indoor Championships in

Kamloops, Canada, our cross country championships in Belfast and our indoor championships at Lee valley, all in March. Don't forget closing dates. Kamloops closes on January 9th.

I hope that you all have a successful and injury free winter of training and competition.



he decision taken at the I.A.A.F Congress in Berlin to split the starting age for masters athletes between 35 in stadia and 40 outside has flushed out some curious attitudes towards athletics for those, like me, no longer in the first flush of youth.

First, let's acknowledge just how unsatisfactory the decisionmaking process was in Berlin. At Bridget Cushen's behest, I spoke out against the proposed rule change at the Area Meeting of European Athletics on the eve of the Congress. I had intended to do so also at the Congress proper, but was assured that the I.A.A.F itself would make clear from the podium that it did not support the proposal. As it was, there was no such clarification and confusion filled the vacuum with the proposal being passed.

As someone who will never be under 40 again, my personal status as a master athlete in any competition is clear. But as B.M.A.F attempts to build interest in master's athletics, it is now faced with explaining to younger newcomers that they may

have to compete for five years on the track as a master before qualifying to do so on the road.

Or, of course, B.M.A.F could simply choose to proceed as if the I.A.A.F Congress had never taken place. I understand that is your plan, and U.K.A is happy to endorse this pragmatic reaction.

Already, the age at which one is considered a Master competitor is higher in athletics than in most other sports. Confusing the issue of qualification would only put us further out of step.

The raising of the age bar outside stadia reflects the advanced age of many of the world's top marathon runners. I'm not aware that any of them, however, are bridling at being technically master's athletes as well as global superstars. Indeed it seems to me a cause for celebration that they are maintaining their competitive peaks beyond the age of 35 rather than something that should trigger a rule change

In supporting B.M.A.F's stance, I have attracted some surprising criticism from within the athletics fraternity for promoting competitive athletics for older runners. One individual pretty high up in the athletics hierarchy told me that ours was a young person's sport and that once individuals had peaked they should turn their hand to coaching, officiating and volunteering to fill the gaps in these fields rather than competing as masters.

You can be sure that I bridled at his suggestion. Not that we haven't gaps in the volunteer sectors that support athletics, but that to my mind competing, officiating and coaching are not mutually exclusive. Indeed I am sure that many B.M.A.F members fill some combination of each of these roles rather than simply pulling on their shorts and training for their own ends.

I recently met with members of B.M.A.F's committee, including Arthur Kimber your new Chairman, and repeated my previous offers of assistance to you as a sister organisation to U.K.A. We don't want to wrest control of masters athletics from B.M.A.F, but we do want athletics to remain a vibrant sport up and down the age scale in the UK, and we are sensitive to the fact that like all of the athletics clubs in the UK you rely entirely on volunteers to oil your wheels and keep your show on the road. If there is practical assistance that we can give, then we're very happy to consider it.

When I glance through the statistics of performances in each edition of "Masters Athletics" I marvel at some of the times, heights and distances posted by British Master athletes. I only wish I could spot a mark that I might seriously hope to challenge when the passage of time places me in the appropriate age category. Alas none have cropped up yet, but I'll keep looking and training! Here's to a successful athletic 2010 for all BMAF members from all at UKA.

Secretary's Report Bridget Cushen

Specifications for the new 2k W75 shot and hammer have been received. Athletes in the 75-plus age categories should not have difficulty in obtaining these through their normal supplier (see advert on back of cover).

The Draft Equality Bill is now before Parliament. Again competitive sport is excluded, just as it was in the Age Discrimination Act. We have made representations as we do not ever again want to witness blatant discrimination against

any 35-year olds who are good enough to finish in the top three in Senior competition and who had fulfilled every facet of the selection criteria for major international events, being overlooked because of their age.

We welcome new members in the 35-39 age category and assure you that our Championships will include this age group whatever your event or level of fitness. There is also a welcome for you at the World Masters Athletics Indoor and Outdoor Championships. If you hope that one day you may even be selected for your Home Country to run in the annual British & Irish Masters International Cross Country - just think of it, you will have over 35 bites at the cherry!

During the year we said farewell to:

Maureen Whitaker: Maureen joined Airdale Harriers as a teenager. There she was to meet Keith, our former President, founding member and for years a key Officer of the BMAF Executive. She was a successful hurdler until she shattered an elbow in a fall. She was one of a few women who competed in the first BVAF Track & Field Championships organised by Keith and she ensured that as many women's events as possible were included! After the formation of World Masters Athletics. she went on to win a bronze relay team medal in 1977 and again at the first European Championships in Italy in 1978 unaware that she had a heart valve problem and should not have been running at all. When her cardiac problems did prevented her from racing, undaunted she threw herself into voluntary work in their native Yorkshire - Secretary of the Bronte Society and various other Organisations. She slipped away just four days short of her 75th birthday. Her GP fittingly summed her up "if she had not done all the things she did; she would not have reached the age she did". We offer our condolence to Keith, their daughter Lyn and their two sons.

Dick Blois, he was a prolific marathon runner and a regular member on the annual trip to the Brugge races in the late Sixties/Seventies. He died in June at his home in Essex age 82, he had been out for a run the previous day.

Roy Fowler. Renowned as one of England's most tenacious distance runner in the golden Sixties, Roy won the equivalent of the IAAF World Cross Country Championships in 1963. On reaching 40 he joined us and became BVAF cross country champion in 1975/76/77. At our 1976 Track & Field Championships in Stretford he won the 5,000m in 14.54.2 and the 10,000m the following day in 30.55.0sec aged 42, and that was after a week working as a painter/decorator. He competed in the first World Veterans Track & Field in Toronto in 1975, taking the 5/10km and 10k cross country, leading the team of M. Barrett, M.Morrell, G. Harrison and Eric Austin to the World title. In Gotenborg in 1977, he retained his 10,000m World crown and was second to the 1964 Olympic 3000m steeplechase gold medallist and long time Belgian international. Gaston Roelants, over the 5km and cross country. Roy died at his Staffs home from cancer in June aged 75.

Pat Davidson (nee Kippax) was one of Britain's top 400m runners. She missed the final of the 1964 Tokyo Olympics by 0.2sec, had she been in the next race, she would have got through. As a member of the Women's VAC, she won several age group Cross Country titles in the Seventies. She also succumbed to cancer in August aged 68.

Phil Munn. The Mitcham AC hurdler was an active competitor until into his Eighties; he passed away after a short illness.

Alf Wood. Alf was a regular at all BMAF and International Championships winning his age group pole vault at the Buffalo World Championships in 1995, and numerous British titles. He and his wife, who accompanied him everywhere, were a famous trapeze artists duo. He later looked after her devotedly as Alzheimer's disease progressively engulfed her. He was aged 81.

Shirley Brasher. The permanently smiling Australian had entered several events at the World Championships in Lahti last July; she was not to get there. She suffered a fatal stroke at her home in Tasmania just weeks before, aged 83. She set 14 World age group records and 22 Australian during her illustrious career.

British Masters Annual Cross Country International

The Ryder Cup golf competition between the USA and Great Britain & NI, started in 1927. The early matches were fairly even. However after repeated US dominance after the Second World War, Great Britain joined with continental Europe to form a team that has enjoyed more competitive matches.

With England dominance in the annual British Masters Cross Country International, never having been beaten in the overall contests, the format could also be changed to a match between England and the "Celtic" nations, namely Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. An extra trophy presented at the awards ceremony would take no time up at all, the time taken at the presentation could easily be shortened to accommodate this, by better organisation and speeding up of the photo calls. In this suggestion there is no need to do away with the existing 5 nation's age group competitions, only changing the overall format.

Using this years` race at Birmingham as an example, the results in an England v Celtic Nations overall trophy competition would be:

W35: E 7-CN 14; W40: E19-CN 9; W45: E9-CN14; W50: E 11-CN12; W55: E9-CN13; W60: E 6-CN19; W70: E 11-CN14; Total Women: E 67-CN 95;

M35: E 45-CN10; M40: E 10 –CN 29; M45: E18-CN 26; M50: E 22 CN 17; M55: E 20 CN 9; M60: E 22 CN 11; M65: E 13 CN 10; M70: E 8 CN 13; Total Men E 158 CN 158;

OVERALL: 1 Celtic Nations 210 points; 2 England 225 points;

In the present format, England again won the Male, Female and Overall trophies, using the method outlined above Celtic Nations win overall by only fifteen points, with the Ladies award going to England, and the Men going to the Combined Nations.

ENGLAND WEATHER STORM IN THE PARK Words: Philip Lee Pictures: Lesley Richardson & Jeremy Hemming

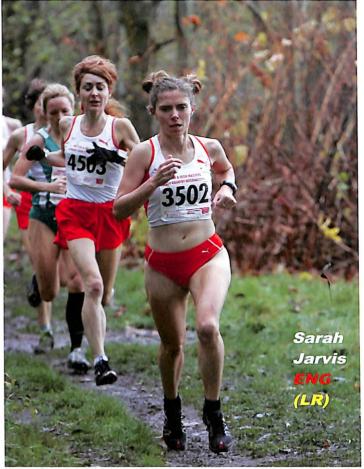
he British and Irish Masters Cross Country International was held in Perry Park, Birmingham in atrocious conditions. Just before the start of the first race the storms which had been predicted to hit Birmingham did! The runners had to contend with strong winds or lashing rain or both which meant that the already soft ground began to cut up almost immediately changing what would have been a flat, fast course in the dry into a much stiffer test in the wet for the runners.

While England successfully continued their hold on the trophies they did not have it their own way. England suffered defeat in the W40 team race where they only came third to the winners Wales and second to the Republic of Ireland in the W50 event. In the individual battle, Niamh O'Sullivan, ROI, returned to winning ways after losing her W45 crown to Jane Clarke of England in 2008. She had a tough battle with Sarah Gee, England, and won by a second. The Republic of Ireland also won the W50 race as Carmel Parnell edged home from the chasing pack. Jane Waterhouse of Scotland, W55, gave the Scottish contingent something to cheer about taking her age race.

The England men had less to be happy about as they only won two gold medals in the individual races up to M65 as Wales and the Republic of Ireland both produced two Gold medallists each. England gained some of their pride back by winning the M65 and M70 events. In the team events, strong M35 and M55 ROI teams took the gold medals and the M60 Team event went to a jubilant Welsh squad which contained **Griff Owens** and **Dic Evans** who were part of the Welsh team that won in the first ever XC International in Wales in 1988. I am grateful for that information from my contact who, being much older, can recall these events.

Race 1 All Women and M65+ over 6k

As this is the largest field of the International, as it accommodates W35 to W65+ and M65 and M70 age groups, races develop all down the field as each age group runner battles to be the winning one. At the front of the field this was not the case. Starting as she left off at Swansea, **Debbie Walters**, Eng, gave another display of strong, front running to win the race and her W40 age group by almost a minute. In the **W35** race, **Sarah Jarvis**, Eng, came home in front of fellow compatriot **Claire McKitterick** and last years winner, **Donna Mahon**. ROI. The three of them had been locked in a closely run battle and at the end only 9 seconds separated



them. **Sarah Wilkinson**, Eng, had also been up at the front of this age group but had to pull up with an injury. *Sarah Jarvis Eng* 24.06, *Claire McKitterick Eng* 24.13, *Donna Mahon ROI* 24.15

Debbie Walters dominance of the **W40** race meant that the focus of attention was further down the field for the other medal places. Second place went to **Carmel Crowley**, ROI, who had finished 5th in last years race, although she was almost two minutes down so strongly had **Debbie** been running. **Marilyn Kitching** took bronze ahead of fellow country women, **Ann Thomas** of Wales and reversed last years order although, this time, further up the field.

Niamh O'Sullivan, returned to winning ways in the W45 race but was made to work hard by an accompanying group of runners which included the eventual second, Sarah Gee, Clare Elms, who had moved up an age group and Jane Clarke, all of England. Clarke's effort faded on a course flatter than she likes so the others continued to race to the line which O'Sullivan won in one of the closest contests of the day. *Niamh O'Sullivan ROI 24.29, Sarah Gee Eng 24.30, Clare Elms Eng 24.41*

The Republic of Ireland also triumphed in the **W50** age category when **Carmel Parnell** came home 5 seconds ahead of second placed **Ann Luke**, Eng, who moved up a place from last year and **Julie Buckley**, also of England *Carmel Parnell ROI 25.39, Ann Luke Eng 25.44, Julie Buckley Eng 25.46*



The **W55** race saw a strong finish from **Jane Waterhouse**, Scotland; who pipped the long time leader **Susan Cooper**, Eng, on the final lap. **Cooper** had won in 2008 with **Waterhouse** in 5th place. **Christine Kilkenny** followed her England team mate home and kept up her form in Internationals.

In the **W60** race there could only be one winner. Coming off the back of several World records and impressive displays on the road and track it was inevitable that **Angela Copson** would win

the age group. Her two minute margin was an impressive run but the fact that she was running with younger age groups must surely help her to achieve times which many younger runners, male and female, would be happy to clock. As she said her legs are "young "as she has only been running since 2007. Her England team mates did a good job in ensuring they also won the team event.

For the M65 who also run 6K it was the case of chase the leader as Martin Ford, Eng, set a fast pace. As Ford continued his way to the gold medal the race for the other medals was hotting up and on the third lap McMonagle consolidated his second spot while Davies eased his way to the bronze medal.

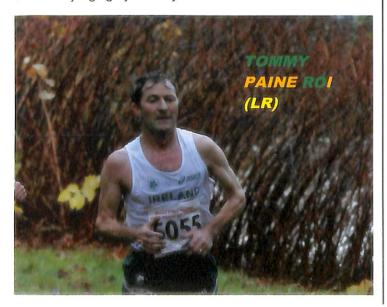

Race 2 M50 - 64 8K

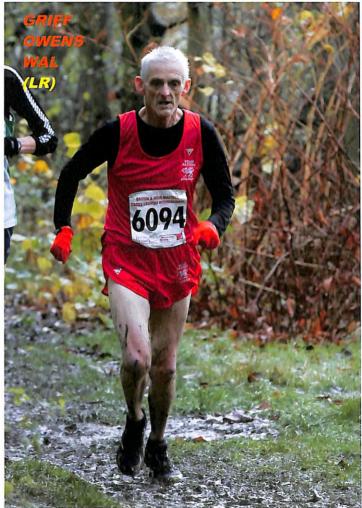
By now the course was beginning to cut up with the deluge of rain that had fallen over it before and during the event. This did not stop **Mike Hager** of England from giving a fine demonstration of strong front running as he came home the winner of the overall race. If **Angela Copson** puts her success down to young legs to what can we attribute the phenomenal success of **Hager as** his legs certainly can't be young but they aren't old judging by the way he blitzed the field.



The M50 race saw England's Bob Atkinson being the only runner brave enough to compete with Hager. With Andy Wetherill, Eng, in second spot followed by Tommy Payne and Jim Stafford, ROI and Jeff Farquhar of Scotland. As Atkinson continued his battle up front with Hager, Wetherill was being joined by team mate Malcolm Eustace and the group by Wales' Ifan Lloyd. As the race entered its final lap the chasing pack were relentlessly closing down on the leader who may have been paying for his efforts at following Hager's pace. By the time they got to the lake for the last time Payne and Farquhar had replaced Atkinson at the front and the order staved that way on the run to the line.

As Reynard continued to lead the following pack were beginning to close the gap up front. By the last lap Owens and Eakin had both over taken Reynard with Johnstone close on his heels. With the course now cutting up badly runners had to decide the best track to follow. On the short sharp climb before the lake section many were picking their way on the extreme edge of the course and some even decided to run outside the markers so desperate was the desire to find fresh ground. If only they had gone further to their right they would have encountered a wide swathe of unused grass. It may have added a metre or two to the distance but the extra purchase gained may have been worth it.

The M35 race was dominated by the Irish. Pat Byrne and Ciaran Doherty of ROI, Dave Morwood NI were among the early leaders which also included Huw Evans, Wales, Alan Murchison, Scotland and lain Twaddle of England. As the race progressed the leading three began to increase their advantage so that by the last lap they had the race between them and it was only a case of what order they would finish in. Morwood moved up a place with a strong finish to take silver with Byrne comfortably in first.

If the Irish were Masters at 35 it was the English who dominated the M40 race. Tim Hartley of England continued where he left off from 2008 with the overall race win. A big thank you must go to all the runners, officials and marshals for putting up with such appalling conditions. When England put on this event at Croydon 5 years ago the weather was also abysmal as rain and hail were the order of the day Perhaps instead of looking towards the Isle of Man as a venue they need to look at the island of Malta to ensure a reasonable day. The irony was that on the Sunday as many runners made their way home the sun was shining and the wind had dropped. Ideal conditions for a race.

Let's hope that when the event moves onto Dublin in 2010 conditions are much better.

BMAF HALF MARATHON AT STEVENAGE. NOVEMBER 1st by Mel James.

A thletes arriving at the Ridlins Stadium on the outskirts of Stevenage, for the BMAF Half Marathon, were greeted with strong winds and torrential rain. The two lap course was particularly undulating on the underpass sections and with these conditions any thoughts of records or road bests were quickly dismissed. It was also decided that age category numbers would not be a very successful exercise in these conditions.



In fact it was a replica of last year's event at Bath in many ways, because not only did the weather cause us problems, but the results system, once again, gave us a further headache.

The race produced another replica, the first two BMAF male athletes home, were also the first two male athletes across the line at Margate in the BMAF Marathon. Viesters Dude (Crawley AC) crossed the line in the time of 1hour, 17m and 47secs, winning the 0/45 section with Peter Thompson (Nene Valley H.) finishing just over 2 minutes behind to win Gold in the 0/50 age group.

There were also some close battles for medals in other age groups, in the 0/55s Des Michael (Barnet & D) held off the challenge of Walter Hill (Crawley AC) by under 2mins and in the 0/70s the battle for Gold was won by Derek Surrey (Shaftesbury Barnet AC) from Michael Miller (Hillingdon AC) by just over 2 minutes.

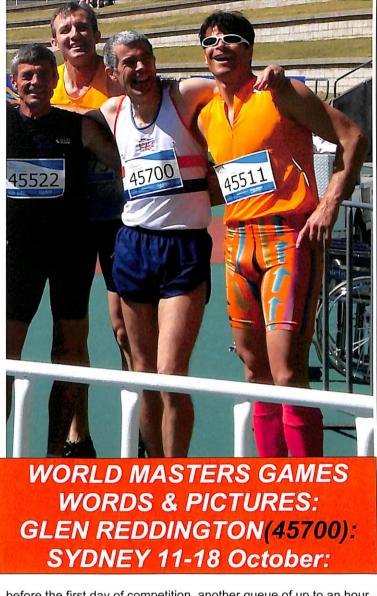
First lady home in the event overall and 0/45 Gold Medal winner was Sarah Gee (Reading R/R). Her time of 1hour, 19m and 53secs was also good enough to be 2nd BMAF finisher in the race, dividing the first two males. All eyes were on Angela Copson (Rugby & Northampton AC). Angela had broken all the other Four 0/60 British bests this year in BMAF Championship races and needed to run under 1h, 28m, 56secs to break her own British best, unfortunately she just failed by 35secs. Angela and Sarah were among the group of five athletes using this race as a warm up for the forthcoming X/Country International at Birmingham, where they will wear the English Vest.

The largest problem for me, as road race secretary, is the continuing problem of race results. Our branch of the sport relies on third parties, that is other clubs or outside bodies for organisation. We therefore are only as good as the data inputted at events and this is reflected in the poor results systems that evolve. I have produced some guidelines for hosts of our championships and will try to make some further inroads with organisers to try to eliminate this problem, which is frustrating for our athletes and me personally.

Start by saying while I was at tracks most of the day every day, I know I didn't see everything. With that in mind I know I suspect I have missed some names or performances.

With the final timetable not available until four weeks before many athletes had already booked flights and found that changes to the days of competition meant they were flying in within 24 hours of their first event or finishing their last competition and heading directly home via the airport. W.M.G accreditation was a nightmare for many of the 28,000 competitors from 28 sports. This nightmare being a queue for accreditation passes, proving a waste of time for everyone concerned all because they had not printed the passes before hand. This was the main reason that local TV gave it a mention the local news. It was worse again for athletes as competition numbers were not available until the day



before the first day of competition, another queue of up to an hour and a half.

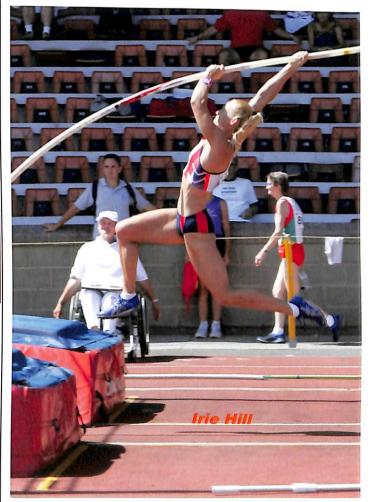
The weather in the few days before the start had a definite chill to it with a good bit of cloud so layers were required. The main stadium was the warm up track for the 2000 Olympics and provided sufficient seating for athletes and family interested in watching. Although it was standing only at the warm up track, both tracks were barely 100m apart and the half marathon and walks starting and finishing just outside of these.

For those who could bear the cost of around \$200 per night the tracks were only minutes walk away. The alternatives appeared to be staying with friends or cheaper accommodation well away from Olympic Park. Getting to the facilities, athletics and others, was relatively easy with free use of the train direct for the centre of Sydney or main line and dedicated link from the outskirts, these trains started as early as 4am more than enough even for a 8am competition.

Many of the other sports that were not located at the Olympic Park were a good train journey away. So while it was free admittance, for the busy athlete seeing other sports was not realistic. Free bus and Ferry travel allowed for day trips around Sydney or leisurely ferry trips to the northern shore of Manly for an alternative Bondi beach if it could be fitted in.

Day one - started early with the 10Km road race located outside the tracks where a handful of Britons competed. As the morning

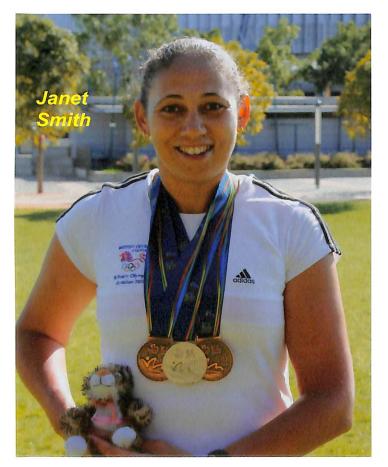
progressed Hammer, shot and steeplechases began in the dry on the warm up track closely followed by a good soaking of rain which dried for the afternoon. The main stadium hosted the first of the pole vaults and long jumps, and 100m heats where in the men's all progressed to the semis. The major note here being ich Steve Peters choosing not to compete any further due to injury. In the Women's 100m, a banner displaying "Godsell for gold" appeared to be stating the obvious with Helen Godsell winning the W55 13.78 with a big gap to second, Judi Stafford also finishing in 7th equal. Judi also managed second in the W55 Pole Vault. Despite a good series of performances in the W50 Shot Hazel Barker collected a silver medal with 10.63. Day one concluded early to allow for the opening ceremony. This was held in the Olympic Stadium where there were no signs that there had ever been an athletic event there with it now being a rugby stadium. The obligatory speeches were made by the dignitaries. Perhaps the notable absentee being Mr Coe. This was followed by some aboriginal didgeridoo playing, John Paul Young with his hit "Love is in the air" and other acts.



Day two began with nearly all sprint hurdles semis being cancelled during warm up or block set up due to athletes not declaring or dropping out, a rather annoying thing for those doing combinations of events which included hurdles. Later in the day those sprint finals saw John Wright second and Jeff Battista third in the M50 100m final. Scott Dorset missed a bronze by 0.01 in M40. With a probable bit of bias here, I consider the most contested event to be the M45 100m. This is where the Canadians were committed with performances that would have been good enough to get 2nd to 4th in Lahti and certainly would have troubled the notable Saraceni. In the field Janet Smith gained a silver in the W45 Weight throw of 13.61m which was a British record. This day also saw the media interest in Athletics. This was quite minor with the only real story being the oldest

athlete to compete and European royalty spending 20 minutes at the stadium all gaining the 30 second slot on local TV. Day three, saw the sprint hurdle finals, here Pat Oakes was a comfortable second in W60 80mH. Myself, Glen Reddington, picking up a gold for what I consider a very poor performance. On the flat, Brenda Fee was third in W60 400m. While in the field Allan Williams was a comfortable second in the M55 Pole Vault.

There was a the obligatory rest day which the officials probably needed bearing in mind the long unpaid days. So the fourth day of competition saw Carol Filer and Hazel Barker in the W50 Pentathlon. It came down to the last event, 800m, where Carol managed to create a large enough gap in the 800m to win the event. Later in the day, although with a new hurdle specification in W50 Hazel turned the tables by clearly winning the 80mH. In throws, Kevin Brown was a clear first in the M45 Discus, 50.78, with David Burrell placing third. Janet Smith collected Bronze in the W45 Hammer. Josh Painter got a silver medal for his 16:36.2 in the M35 5000m.



Day five, Carole Filer was busy again this time winning the W50 Long Jump. Helen Godsell made it a sprint double gold winning the W55 200m. Brenda Fee also picked up silver in the W60 200m. When it came to the mens 200m there did seem to be something a bit odd with 200m being across 3 days while the 400m were only across 2, each having heats, semis and finals. However, Reddington, M45, Battista and Wright, M50, all won their 200m heats, with Jeff also having won gold the 400m final earlier. In the M55 Triple Jump Paul Oakes achieved a bronze after missing one in the Long jump several days earlier.

Day six and the Filer/Barker competition continued with Carole getting the gold and Hazel silver in the W50 High Jump, other British activity was in qualifiers or at a lower level

Day seven had the last of the non track events, the Half Marathon, starting early again with a handful of Britons taking part. While back on track Judi Stafford concluded her games with a bronze in the W55 300mH. In the field Janet Smith also ended her busy week with a third medal, bronze in the W45 weight Pentathlon, 3985, another British record. Iain McEwan collected Bronze in the M50 High Jump. In the 200m John Wright and Jeff Battista had a serious battle for the silver and bronze respectively. With the 200m over Peters, Battista and Barker then set a new record for the time to get from Olympic Park to the airport.

The conclusion of events came in with the relays. These were different to those we know with them being a combined age relay, 160+, 200+ etc. and, the use of women in a men's team. While the US and Canada took these seriously, in general these were about taking part. The last of the relays was done about 5pm and Olympic park was a almost empty place with it looking like all other sports were long gone, perhaps to get to the closing ceremony. The ceremony was a significantly lower key affair concluding in a small park in Sydney centre where the Aussie competitors had a good sing along to the band.



On other topics, doping control were present and kept the usual low profile but still pounced quietly. One lesson W.M.A/E.V.A. could learn is that of medal presentation, this was almost immediate. Final results being given in the post competition area and the first three being taken to medal presentation, usually still in competition kit. I'm not sure how they would have handled protests under I.A.A.F rules but to my knowledge there were no issues there. With the W.M.G occurring in a W.M.A outdoor year there has been talk about having the W.M.A champs as part of the W.M.G. That of course raises the question would the medals have on them W.M.A or W.M.G? Even if this does happen, at the rate with which W.M.A move we'll all be one age group, or maybe two, higher by that time.

Another observation of mine during my following holiday was the number of W.M.G branded bags that we were given that I saw around Sydney and the eastern coast in that time. Clearly many had chosen to do the same, which is apparently how the government philosophy for the country appears to be developing.

Finally, despite the queuing incidents at the start, I, and others, have to admit there was a professionalism about the officials, track and field, which I have rarely seen at any EVAC/WMA champs and it's probably only UK officials that can match this standard. Perhaps this is where we really lead the world. Maybe it's a cultural thing or maybe this is their Olympic legacy.

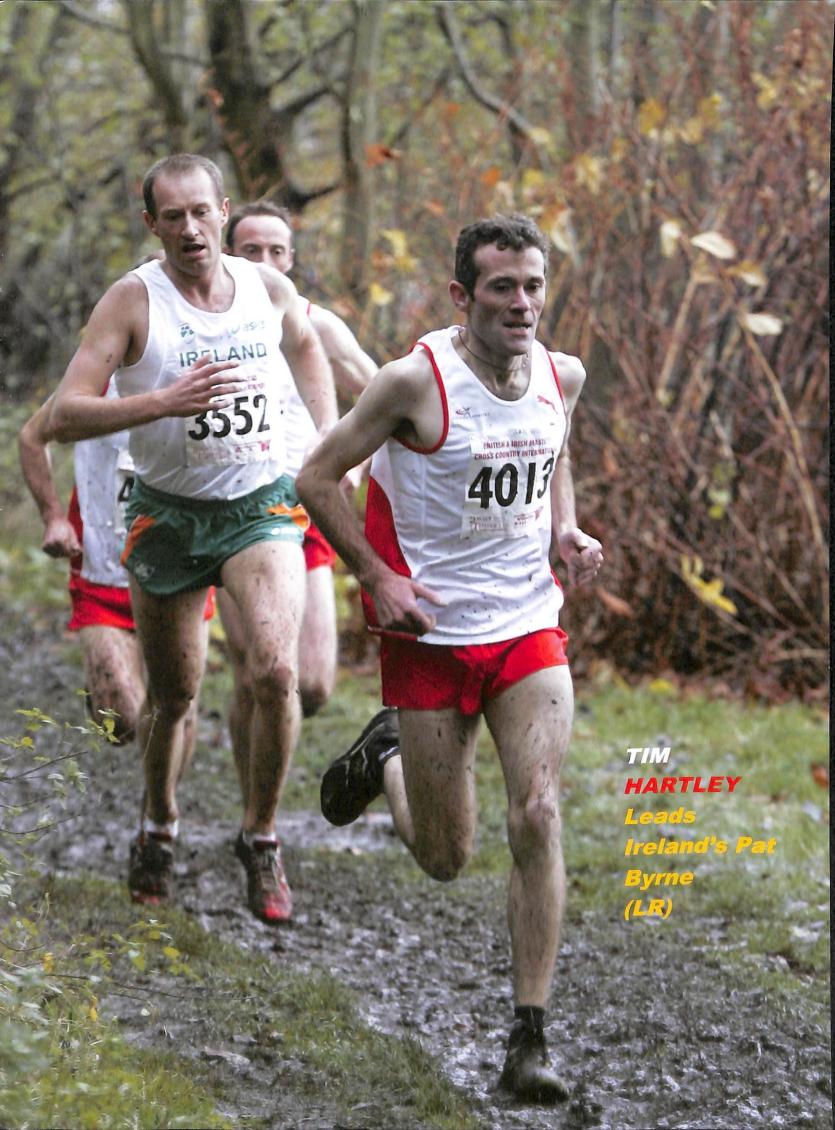
