

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT Arthur Kimber

ince the last issue of the magazine our athletes have been active in a wide range of competitions. The European Track and Field Championships in Nyiregyhaza, Hungary, attracted 274 British entries and we finished second in the medals table, but well behind the indomitable German team. Athletes faced very hot conditions and a violent thunderstorm and flooding, and there were some officiating shortfalls and accommodation problems.

The England Athletics Masters Track and Field Challenge on a warm and sunny day in Solihull was again contested by teams from all the 10 UK regions and proved very competitive, Southern Counties Veterans winning the men's match and Midland Masters the women's and the overall Bill Taylor trophy. The final track and field event of the year was the Decathlon/Heptathlon championships.

On the road our half marathon championship was held in the Burnham Beeches race. The women's race was won by W45 Sarah Gee in a course record time of 1:16:21. Sarah notched up another victory in our 10k championship in Wolverhampton and was first woman to finish in the open race in a fast 34:22, while Gordon Lee was first man home in 31:18. In our 10k race walking championships M60 Ian Richards was the first BMAF man to finish in 49:29, beating all the younger athletes and W45 Diane Bradley the first woman in 54:37. For the rest of the year we look forward to the 10 mile road championships and in cross country the relays and the British and Irish International in Dublin (ED: I have yet to receive Race Walking results hence they are not in this issue.).

At a recent executive meeting in September it was agreed to standardise age groups from the beginning of 2011 for team scoring in road running, race walking and cross country for men and women, with 10 year age groups, 35-44, 45-54, 55-64, 65-74, and if necessary, 75+

Further meetings with Corporate and Sporting Events and Bourne Sports are planned to discuss additional points of detail about travel and accommodation to international meetings and kit.

On line entries are beginning to be used for International championships and we are considering introducing our own on line system for entries to all BMAF championships. Peter Duhig, Overseas Entries Coordinator, after consultation with the relevant entries secretaries and other members of the executive committee, is prepared to produce such a system.

The bid to host the European Non Stadia Championships in 2013 in Swansea, as pointed out in the last issue, has suffered some delay, and the venue may be switched to Cardiff. We have permission from E.V.A.A to make a late bid, as we were not able to confirm our bid at the General Assembly in Nyiregyhaza.

We have formally placed our prospective bid to host the 2015 World Championships in the Olympic Stadium in London. Three hurdles may stand in our way. One, UK Athletics has made a bid for n the IAAF World Championships and if this succeeds we will not be able to continue. Two, there is still uncertainty about the future of the facility after 2012. Three, we need to raise the necessary funding. We expect to face competition from Perth, Australia, Bydgoszcz and Torun, Poland and Lyon, France. A small working party of Maurice Doogan, Phil Bell, Mike May and I will monitor developments and keep you informed.

Have a good autumn. I hope to see many of you in Dublin.

SECRETARY'S REPORT Bridget Cushen.

e have many members who are working in or retired to other E.U countries and who have unfortunately sometimes experience problems entering competitions or not been awarded medals or prizes. Here we welcome any athlete aged 35 years and over to enter our Championships, either as an Open entry or as a member of one of our clubs, and should they finish in the first three or qualify for a team award they are treated in the same way as British athletes. We submitted a Proposal to the European Veterans A.A General Assembly, held during the Track & Field Championships in Hungary, asking that other E.U countries accord the same facilities. As it was not a Constitutional matter, we could only draw the subject to the attention of other Delegates and hope that they will consider. The Proposal got the E.V.A.A Council's support. Our nomination of Arthur Kimber for Vice President was unsuccessful; Poland's Jerzy Krauze, who finished 4th in the M45 Decathlon, got the majority vote. The election of this very capable multi-linguist to the EVAA Board should assuage any fears that the multi events might be discontinued. Izmir was successful in their bid to hold the 2014 European Track & Field Championships.

Cross-Country Secretary

Philip Lee reported at our A.G.M that he would not be seeking re-election next year and we are now looking for someone to take on this role. If you would like to put something back into Masters Athletics, and this is predominantly a winter job, ask your club to nominate you for election at our A.G.M next year. Meanwhile, both our Road Running and Cross-Country Secretaries would be please to help you if you would like to shadow them now as they compile their 2011 Fixture list and familiarise yourself with B.M.A.F work.

For the benefit of our many new members, we reprint the following information:

"Many Local Authorities operate the Free Access for National Sports People (FANS) scheme. If you have competed in a European or World Masters Championships, the British & Irish Masters International cross-country, hold a World / European age group record or even ranked top in your event, you may be eligible for free use of your local track, gym etc. Your Local Authority will require proof, i.e. your Age Group, event(s) and Championships you have competed in."

Entry Fees for Hungary

At our A.G.M the favourable fluctuation in the £/€ currency at transfer date and whether or not there should be a refund to members, was discussed. The Executive were asked to review. After much discussion, we have now agreed that there would be no refund as B.M.A.F affairs have to be viewed as a whole and not individually event by event. We must cater for all events and disciplines, some of which are profitable and some perpetual loss makers. Overall the profitable events help to support the weaker ones.

First Claim Members

It has been brought to the attention of B.M.A.F that several members have been running as First Claim Members for two U.K.A Clubs in different countries in B.M.A.F Championships. B.M.A.F would like to bring it to the attention of ALL members that they can only be a First Claim Member for ONE U.K.A club when competing in B.M.A.D Championships. There is no Secondary First Claim rule. B.M.A.F suggests that the members concerned decide which is to be their First Claim club they wish to represent and compete for only that one. Failure to do so may result in their disqualification as an individual competitor and also of their club in a team event.

Italian athlete Nour Eddine CHAKOUR has been declared guilty of a doping offence. The World Masters Athletics (W.M.A) acknowledges the information recently received from the I.A.A.F that Chakour, a master athlete from Italy, was found guilty of a doping offence. He was sanctioned by F.I.D.A.L with a two years period of ineligibility (from April 20, 2010 until April 19, 2012).

The analysis of the Italian athlete's urine sample, collected on March 3, 2010 at the Italian Marathon Championship in Piacenza, revealed the presence of the prohibited substances Norandrosterone, Furosemide, Betamethasone and Dexamethasone.

His result achieved at the Italian Championship will be disqualified accordingly.

W.M.A Secretary Winston Thomas received the bids for World Masters Athletics Championships Indoor 2014, and Stadia 2015.

The bidding cities are: 2014: Budapest (HUN) and Valencia (ESP)

2015: Bydgoszcz/Torun (POL), London (GBR), Lyon (FRA) and Perth (AUS).

Effective immediately, the minimum period for submission of TUE's has been extended to 30 days before the start of championships.

This change is to comply with the recent I.A.A.F / W.A.D.A variation in submission time.

Stan Perkins WMA President (23.07.2010)

Four Stadia-Candidates have been nominated for the position of Technical Manager (Stadia), following the resignation of Serge Beckers (BEL).

The following are nominated; Silvana Delia (ALB), Maurice Doogan (GBR), René Hondelinck (NED) and George Kostaras (GRE).

Controversial action by safety officers in Hungary.

Eric Horwill reports from the European championships, that there were several disqualifications involving older athletes during the championships.

In the first women's 5k track Walk the safety officer disqualified the last two athletes for it is assumed unduly delaying progress of the event. The two athletes concerned were W80 and W85 respectively. They were not in distress and walking quite satisfactory. Considering that they were giving the leaders 15 to 20 years advantage it is illogical to accuse them of being too slow.

Several members of the Great Britain team complained that a M90 Athlete in a 1500 metre race with several younger athletes suffered a similar fate.

Older athletes should be treated as equals with the younger groups and not be penalised by age

discrimination, remember they have paid the same entry fee and incurred the same travelling and accommodation costs as younger athletes. Also many have supported these championships for many years.

Let us hope that the organisers receive many complaints from the member countries, and will reconsider a policy which would appear to be to most people, dramatically unfair.

Alastair Aitken talks to some of our members during the B.M.A.F. Championships in Wales.

Athlete GORDON HICKEY (M75) was County high jumper in the White City stadium days and worked for television. He achieved a first, second, third, and two fifths in his group at Cardiff, which would be surprising when you know that in recent times the doctors took three years to find out he was diabetic and he now has no sensation in his hands and feet, that has naturally effected his throwing. However he won the javelin with a modest 25.32.



TERRY BISSETT (M60) Sprints"I am pleased winning all three sprints and that my leg is still OK. I tore the medial ligament inside, ligament behind the back of the knee and small ligament that goes with the bone to the lower cartilage last Saturday. I have had treatment all week to get me out here. Injections, acupuncture, the lot, just to get me running so I am pleased it is no worse

now, I won the 100 and 400 and I did not believe I would run at Cardiff.

I ran Monday for the club and just about made the end of the 100 before I had to STOP, as I was in so much pain. It was good news because I am going to Hungary in two weeks."

JOHN TILT (M45) Hurdles & 400 " I used to be a rugby player for Cranleigh and Portsmouth. I used to love it till I was 40 but I had also been running just as a summer sport since 25. It got to a stage when rugby was getting too big for me. I thought I would do something a bit safer."

KERMIT BENTHAM (M5) 400 " Once a '46' man at the 400, he has been running the 'Man Killer' event for some time!

" I have been racing for 34 years so that is why my body is falling apart' He joked ' The sprint over 400 keeps me going. The body works but the chassis is knackered."

PAUL TIMMONS (M60) 800/1500 winner from Ireland has had a serious blood disorder in recent years, but has it under control. "Michael Mann and I have been racing against each other for some time now.

'I joined the marathon boom at 30 when I gave up playing football. I was outside right in junior soccer in Ireland. I gave up athletics from 40-50. At 53 I ran my first track race and was 3rd in the Irish Masters in the 800 and won the 1500.'

"I was 3rd in the British Masters at 55 in the 800/1500. I was 60 in November'

'I simply love coming to the vets. I think it is so good, as they give a medal to the first three HOME COMPETITORS and if someone from outside as a guest in the 'Open' event comes in the first three they get a medal too! I think that is fantastic. I think the British Masters is run as good as any major meeting. A great atmosphere."

CAROLINE POWELL (W55 200/400) " I have not raced since the World Championships outdoors, and I have missed racing all Winter because I injured my back. It was the first Race since going to Finland last year."

NEIL GRIFFIN (M60 DISCUS/SHOT PUT ► He broke British records indoors this year"I am a lot stronger than last year.' I started throwing at the age of 13.

Looking back Gateshead was special 54.29 (M50 Discus Gold medal in World Masters Championships).' Of the great competitors, he thought Al Oerter was a great competitor and John Powell, was technically smooth as a discus thrower. Neil competed against them in the preliminarily round of the AAA's when they competed in London'

When Capes was on form we had some brilliant Southern Counties competitions. I did my PB then of 51. 35 in the discus and came sixth and just qualified. You could get a medal with that today. I was in the Olympic Trials when I was 38 years old. I was going to

pack it in at 49 and coach my daughter... Then I thought I am going to train for the 50's age group and I started throwing quite well so I got sponsorship from the Council to go to Gateshead and Italy. (He threw 50.49 in the European Championships wining the M50 discus in 1998)

He often goes down and trains these days with Chris Melluish. Paul Dickinson and Mark Wiseman He has been advised in his life by Charlie Forsythe, Mike Winch and John Hillier, so plenty of good throwers for him to talk to there...

Like Mick Hazelwood, who was competing in the discus at Cardiff. They both said "It the camaraderie is the best part of Masters Athletics."



I was announcing at Parliament Hill Fields as Highgate Harriers Press secretary, the very Saturday after Cardiff and, there was Neil Griffin throwing the Discus one of the **last** people to leave the track. Of course he picked up valuable points for Windsor's Southern league team.

JOHN BRADLEY & JOHN HOWE (1 & 2 in M65 Pole Vault) John B: - "I am carrying an injury and frightened to put my foot down but I did 3.00 metres. My best ever was in the British League when I did 3.60. I coach my son Tom Davis who won the English Schools.' JOHN HOWE (2.60)"I have had two years with a knee injury but it is the best this season so, I am absolutely delighted. I am

on the way back. In 2002 I got medals in Berlin when I was 60.'

'.I found doing the decathlon an achievement with the 10 events in two days and I have won five of those competitions' To me the most important thing is the camaraderie, friendships made and the swapping of tea shirts in the Masters athletic movement.. It was the best thing I ever did when coming in at 46."

CLARE ELMS, (W45 1500/5000) "My best

performance I think was my British record of 4.33 in the Southern Championships at Crystal Place. I really enjoyed that. I started really slowly. I was really pleased and my Dad was there. My children play football and all sort of things in the weekend. When I won the British Masters in Ireland and then came back to London and won the Southern Championship veteran cross country that was a busy weekend!"

"At the AVIVA European Trials I came 5th in Birmingham ahead of people younger than my children (24, 21 and 18)! Each year I have to work a little harder I want to be better and not throw in my shoes yet."

ARTHUR KIMBER CHAIRMAN OF THE BMAF ABOUT HIS YEAR IN OFFICE "Corporate Sporting Events have replaced WGT as our sponsors and they have provided

accommodation & Travel for Hungary which is working well. With Bourne Sports the other contract provided quite a range of kit also a re-designed track suit. That has been good. In my experience the people in the organisation worked extremely hard. PAUL DICKINSON is a great role model for us. When you are involved with the Executive Committee you see the time they spend on it. All the other people who work like Peter Duhig, who does all the entries for the international Championships, the photographers, so many people who work hard and we have a good relationship with Sport England and UK athletics now'

'I have been on the scene for two years Vice Chairman and then Chairman. I always knew they worked hard but did not realise how much. It was good to gain the gold medal on the track the day after becoming Chairman in Birmingham. Last year."

MARY AXTELL W65 100 champion BMAF

"Three in a row indoors and outdoors. I am really; really pleased with the 100 (She is 67 but does not look it!)
'I first started running at High School in Winchester. My PE teacher got me going.

He said: - 'You are very good, you ought to go to a club so, then I went and joined Southampton- MIKE SMITH was there. He coached me and I went through to from Hampshire Schools up to the English schools and I got silvers and bronzes for the 100, right through to the seniors. I trained to be a PE teacher at Chelsea PE College and I ran for them. (10.9 for the 100yards). I did the Southern, Inter-Counties and did all those kind of events, alongside ANNE PACKER and MARY RAND.

I am a good a friend of Anne Packer. I retired at 27 and I had four children, then I came back to running again when I was 47. In between I played hockey for Hampshire. I was good at hockey for many years and I was playing up till 47 for New Milton hockey club. 'She added ' I was fit so it enabled me to get back to athletics.'

You don't realise actually what athletic training is about. You think you can just go and run. The first I did was the Southern Counties Vets and I pulled a muscle while I was leading. I thought, I have got to take a little while to condition myself better and then the following year I did my first Championship and I won the British indoors at Cosford over 60 and 200.

That would be in the 50's age group. In the race were UNA GORE and PAT McNAB. I went out like a rocket and I could not believe I had won it. They were all thinking 'Who is this person?'

'This person' became quite a regular at all the Championships. I had a fair few injuries. I have had two knee ops' but I have been so pleased to win for three years indoors and outdoors.'

The other things that Mary Axtell does in her busy athletic life:-

"I am a level 5 road official, cross-country official and a track official. I referee matches and things. I am on my Club committee and a Life member of Southampton. I have got athletics in my Blood I suppose!"

ell what can you say about the inter area, I suppose in the list it's the number two in the UK Masters track and Field scene. It's very enjoyable and the Athletes seem to like it, and it has the backing of England Athletics. However, it has to be asked if the central Norman Green Stadium in Solihull, is really up to the mark for this fixture.

No electronic timing, no wind gauge, a Jumps pit in which the sand level is so low a record could not be even considered. Catering and changing which cannot be considered convenient for competitors and spectators alike, and a very poor public address system.

All this aside, Southern Counties and Midland Masters battled for the lead the whole afternoon, with Southern Counties winning the Male match by just 3.5 points. Midlands had 11 points advantage over Eastern and 33 points over Southern Counties in the Women's match. This meant that Midlands won the combined trophy by 11 points.

My race of the day was the thriller between European 400 metres bronze medallist Bernard Ward , and European 800 metres Champion Rob Andrew over 800 metres. The race was there for the taking by either competitor, until the very last metre when Andrew just managed to secure victory. Talking to Bernard afterwards, it appears he has run very few 800 metres, but honestly his tremendous 400 metres pace would surely serve him well should he try more.

Just one record today, came from Rugby's Kevin Murch with 56.17 in the Javelin, Kevin watched by a large family group made his mark at a distance that would have won a Silver medal in Hungary.

Steve Peters was in terrific form in the sprints as the five times European Champion, recorded a fast 23.7 in the 200 metres. He appeared to be faster than this in the third leg of the Medley as he powered past the change over only just managing to maintain his footing. Steve, who performed wonders for GB in the Olympics assisting the Cycling team, is clearly the World's top man as far as M55 sprints are concerned.

Emma Beales was AAA Heptathlon Champion in 1995, so nice to see her winning Shot and Discus.

Sue Samme running for Northern Vets, was a good winner over 1500 metres, but is possibly happier on the Road as she has a personal best of 1h 24.38 for the Half Marathon. Jane Pidgeon who now holds World, World Indoor and European Championships for the Steeplechase (3,000 flat in the Indoors), and had a fourth place in the 2002 AAA Championships. Took a few minutes from her role of one of the Track Judges to win the 3,000 metres.

European Champion Sue Yeomans, had three attempts at a new record of 2.81 in the Pole Vault, but was unlucky.






17th European Veterans Track & Field Championships, 16-24 July 2010, Nyiregyhaza, Hungary

World Records for Irie Hill and the W55 4 x 400 quartet!

Travelling across the Hungarian Plains to this former garrison town in 31° heat / 90° humidity, the 274-strong British team and their supporters were pre-warned as to the likely weather conditions they might have to endure during their competition. Athletes billeted in surrounding hotels had mixed fortunes, but the majority of competitors stayed in the College's halls of residence where some rooms had air conditioning but those allocated otherwise well equipped and spacious rooms without this spent many a sleepless night under a cold shower as daytime temperatures reached a consistent 34-37°. The large communal breakfast room reflected a kaleidoscopic and mixtilineal of Europe as in quintessentially Masters' athletics, old acquaintances were fondly renewed and performances discussed over breakfast as hoards of friendly volunteers re-filled cereal bowls, bread baskets, coffee pots etc. Across the road a large exhibition tent housed the information packs, stands with brochures for future championships, souvenirs etc and beyond that was the main newly resurfaced 8-lane track with excellent facilities. The second stadium was only a short bus ride away; the road walks were held around a pleasant square in town and the marathon on a 7km traffic free course. Entries fell well short of the expected 5000 athletes due no doubt to the current economic situation throughout Europe, 41 countries were present but their teams were smaller - only 23



from Greece, 47 from Portugal - totalling just over 3000 competitors entering a total 6539 events.

There were plenty of volunteers officiating but their judging, particularly in the field events, was questionable. What happened in the women's 5/10,000m races was inexcusable as despite the use of chips some competitors had to run an extra lap or were stopped short and subsequently disqualified. W45 Tracey Gibson, W50 Janice Moorkite, Fionnuala McCourt and Ruth McGill were all detrimentally affected.




Whilst we applaud the European Veterans A.A for new initiatives, some of them backfired here. Their proposal last year to try to drop the Heptathlon / Decathlon was openly challenged by the multi-eventers in Lahti, but their introduction of some pre-veteran (30-34) events did go ahead. E.V.A.A's introduction of medal standards caused the most derision. They may look easily achievable on paper but factor in 37° heat plus unbearable humidity and races scheduled for a late morning or early evening start it was little wonder some athletes felt aggrieved. Times in all distance races were slower; most of the 29 entrants in the M60-64 age category recorded their slowest ever 10,000m, run in the midday sun, the M70-74 competing at 20.00, needed to duck under 60 minutes to meet the standard. Is it fair on Organisers or sponsors to see a super fit 90 year old refused a medal simply because they should have been 100th of a second faster? EVAA defends the need for medal standards by showing a video of some older athletes competing in the hurdles or steeplechase who clearly had no technical coaching and only entered in the hope of picking up an easy medal.

E.V.A.A held a seminar for Safety Judges last year. Here they were standing menacingly trackside, yellow / red cards in hand ready to warn or DQ any runner who appeared to be struggling. We accept that Meeting Directors have safety responsibilities, but older experienced athletes generally know when they have had enough and will drop out. Indeed several of them did just that when they found they could not cope with the humidity. After paying their way to get to these Championships some athletes were determined to finish and a few physical altercations ensued. W70 Cecilia Morrison was badly impeded in her race as a male Safety Judge physically removed a female competitor from the track.

Delegates to the next E.V.A.A General Assembly will have to ensure that medal standards never reappear at these Championships and that there is equality for the older age groups teams. Team medals in the 20k road walk for instance, were awarded up to M65+ only, yet Germany, Latvia, Italy, Russia and ourselves could have easily assembled teams from the 37 walkers who entered in the Over Seventies age categories.


Despite the humidity and intermittent heavy thunder storms a remarkable 20 World, 34 European, 103 Championship age group records were set during the ten days of competition.



The competition schedule and performances of many of our members over the 10-day Championships in such humidity should drive some Senior international athletes to shame -Virginia Mitchell won her W45 400 Hurdles in a straight final going on to win her heats and finals in both the 400m and 800m from quality international fields. Ditto Stephen Peters in the 100/200/400 heats, semis and final sprints and both relays. Glen Riddington, Jeff Battista, Dunwell, Powell, Scott, Logan, Jonathan Tilt, Tunstall; brilliant M60 hurdler Tony Wells and the defending European champions Jane Horder and Caroline Powell were out on the track practically every competitive day. Little wonder therefore that even the most ardent critic will begrudgingly admit that we are, and have been for some time, the most successful section of British athletics. At the conclusion of yet another European Championship only Germany was ahead of us.




The Hept / Decathlon, a Pentathlon for the Over 70's and all the 10kms were held on the first two days, 15/16th July, when the humidity was most intense. At last the Heptathlon was allocated the main stadium alongside the M35-50 Decathlon. Troy Kennedy had a clear 5sec win in his M35 decathlon 1500m, placing him 5th overall and a terrific finish to the M40 1500m saw H-M Bruder of Germany (4.49.45) just hold off Sarmiento, Spain (4.49.61). With 146 entries, plus 58 in the Heptathlon and 36 in the Pentathlon, these three events were well organised and ran smoothly. The track walks on Day 2 attracted a good entry. It was encouraging to see 10 in the M35 age group, 30 in the M60 and 19 W60. 5 men and one woman were DQ'd; all in the older age categories. Arthur Thomson easily retained his M70 track title and the 20k road walk by a whopping four minutes, Ian Richards was a comfortable M60 winner in the 5000m track walk and a class M35 field was headed home by Antonio Porras of Spain in 21.09.63 and the road walk in 1.33.51sec. Our Assistant Team Manager Eric Horwill also managed to walk himself on to the podium.



Weather conditions changed rapidly during the 10-day competition. On Day 4 a heavy thunderstorm and three hours of torrential rain saw cars submerged wheel deep in water. Jumps and throws had to be postponed. The first road walk in the town centre started at 07.30 and only just escaped but the rest had to be postponed until late evening after the fire brigade had pumped the water away. On the evening of Day 8 an exciting M40 pole vault competition was marred, firstly by high winds that unsteadied the bar and then a looming thunderstorm affected visibility as flashes of lightning lit up the stadium. M45 Mark Johnson was fortunate that his event had just finished at 17.15 by which time the Yorkshire man had the gold medal in his pocket after his 4.40m clearance in an excellent series. World M55 record holder, Wolfgang Ritte, Germany, drew a crowd of followers in for his 09.00 start. He soared over the 4.30m bar for another major title. The women's championship was poorly supported with only 25 entries overall. Held in the second stadium with the M70-plus (17 entries), it was as graceful, competitive and exciting as ever. Natasha Brunning took the W35 title. Irie Hill re-wrote the record books again breaking her own British, European and World records with a

fantastic new W40 3.85m clearance, confidently coming in at 3.20m and narrowly missed at 4.00m. Hardy perennial Carla Forcellini of Italy also set a new World W50 3.30m mark. Brigitte Van De Kamp of Holland also cleared this height but with more failures. Sue Yeomans took the W55 European title.

The sprinters found the new surface in the main stadium to be very spongy, one describing it as like running in mud and overall times were slow. With up to four heats, (5 in the



200/400m), semis and finals in age groups up to 50-plus and top quality fields, little wonder those who had done the 100/200 double felt "absolutely knackered" after the relays. Sprinters who also entered the 400m or hurdles and relays would have had to run eleven quality races in ten days. As you will see from the results fully covered in the Results pages here, there were outstanding British victories and all our sprinters are to be congratulated. One absolutely surprised and delighted competitor was Moira West from Hampshire who only recently took up sprinting. In her first ever international championships having turned 60 in April, she clocked her fastest ever time in the 200m for a bronze medal, placed 4th in both the 100/400m and got a silver in both relays. Commiseration to our Photographer Tom Phillips who was shut out of the final and the relays yet again in that most competitive British sprint age group, the M55. With John Browne, Wally Franklyn, Viv Oliver, Chris Padmore, Stephen Peters et al all getting through, the final was a British dominance - perhaps Tom should take a banana skin with him next time! Herbert Kreiner of Austria won the M50 100m hurdles in 14.25sec on his 55th birthday; your age on the first day of competition determines your age category. It will of course be recognised as a new M55 World record.

The 800m heats and finals had their fair share of pile-ups. Adrian Haines being one of the fallers when challenging for a

medal 200m out in the M40 group. The women's 1500m and M35-45 age categories were straight finals but heats were necessary in the M50-plus. Safety Judges were again very proactive during the steeplechase races.

Out on the field Steve Linsell cleared 1.84m to win the M45 high jump on count back in an entertaining competition from Pistono of Italy who had two earlier failures. Equally as compelling was the dual in the W40 won by the Russian Semashko from Katalin Deak, Hungary, both clearing 1.64m. Rex Cameron won the M45 age category triple jump in Liubliana; here he just missed the M50 European crown by 0.01cm to the Austrian, Georg Werthner. John Nicholls'




15.35m effort won him the Shot title in the 14-strong M40 field. Rosemary Chrimes' W70 World discus record fell to the Russian ex-triple Olympian. evergreen Tamara Danilova who reached out to 33.55m and how nice to see M70 Bill Gentleman back in the competition ring again after major heart surgery, taking home a handful of medals.

Safety Judges were out on the Marathon course on the final day. Run over an out-and-back 7km coned off mainly flat road in fortunately cooler but still humid conditions under an overcast sky. There was a cut off limit of six hours. In the circumstances this was reasonable as marshals cannot be expected to stay out for longer, but again too many runners were DQ'd and many dropped out. Won in 2.41.44sec by 39 year old Italian Mario Prandi from Georg Ruess, Austria (2.42.54), and winner of the previous two European titles. Christopher Flavell, (7 M40), led the British home. Alan Roberts was our lone M45 entry. Walter Hill 5th M55, David Beattie 5th M60 and Alan Appleby 7th M60 only just missed out on a team medal. Finishers also included M55 Robert Wilson 12th, Maurice Hemingway 16th and John Taylor 8th in the M70 race. The first four in the M50, (won by the Belgian vanHaecke in 2.48.19) were all inside the 3-hour mark. Having completed their track and road walks, Fiona Bishop and Maureen Noel tackled the 26-miles where Maureen got 3rd in the W45 race and with W50 Heather Stuart their cumulative time won them the W45 team gold, a fantastic team performance. At the end of a long day,

Assistant Team Manager Archie Jenkins reported all back home safely.

The sprint relays reflected the low overall entry with some countries struggling to get an age group quartet together in the older age categories. Team Manager, Maurice Doogan, spent some time firstly rounding up available sprinters and then assembling teams, the resulting medal haul was considerable. Joan Trimble, Joan Howe, Joylyn Saunders-Mullins and Caroline Powell wrote themselves into the history books with a new World W55 4 x 400m record in 4.10.80sec erasing the 4.45.41sec record, also by the British quartet Yvonne Priestman, Nancy Hitchmough, Viv Bonner and Caroline Marler that had stood since Poznan in 2006. Caroline Powell now has a stake in the W50 World 4 x 100m and 4 x 400m records set in Lahti last year although she was 55 at the time. Overall, members will reflect on an enjoyable Championship

despite the conditions and the judging. You might like to pencil in the European Indoor in Gent next March, the road running



and walking Championships in the Moselle district of France in May and the World Masters Athletics Track & Field Championships in Sacramento next July. All are open to any person aged 35 years and over.

BMAF HALF MARATHON BURNHAM BEECHES 22ND AUGUST WORDS: MARTIN DUFF (ATHLETICS WEEKLY)

HILE the youngest masters generally gave the event a miss, following a recent pattern, there was plenty to cheer about further up the age range

Nevertheless only 91 entered the BMAF championships, a far cry from the 1000 that entered the first at Welwyn in the late 'eighties, when there was also prize money on offer from race sponsors.



Sara Gee was the class act and dominated the women's race from the outset to annex the National Masters championship, in 76:21. The 46-year-old has run 75:59 this year but, deep in preparation for the Toronto Marathon, admitted that her highest ever mileage of 85 to 90 per week was leaving her over-tired. Of her run here Gee said: "I was three minutes faster than last year when I won in 79:30." Her next race was to be the BMAF 10km championships on September 12th.

"I was 28:30 at five and 58:10 at 10 miles," added Gee who left W40 winner Tina Oldershaw six minutes down: "I had a bad night last night as I had a lack of sleep because of nerves," said Oldershaw

Sally Musson continued her W55 domination with 88:35 clocking and said:"It's OK, but it felt quite tough and breathing was difficult also, I had two toenails removed on Monday," added the Tonbridge runner by way of an excuse for what she thought was a slowish time of 88:35, although it was five seconds faster than her previous 2010 best.

New M45 Steve Male was in the first three overall throughout before easily taking the BMAF title in 74:02. The Oxford man had few challengers and said: "I stopped with a stitch at ten." That he was able to still win is a sad reflection on the quality of the entry in the younger men's age groups.



Masters in the older categories did, however, shine: Dave Cox took the M55 race easily in 79:52 and said: "I took it easy to half-way but the hills were not too bad." Des Michael was always ahead in the M60s but was pressed at half-way, then again later, by Ryde's Peter Young. Before winning in 85:11. "He nearly caught me with two miles to go but I imagined it was a 5km race, at the end," said Michael. Leading M65 Martin Ford was always close behind these two and maintained his challenge to win his group in 85:58 but said: "the hamstring started to tighten and, as I'm training for the World Mountain race in Poland, I thought I'd ease back." 

nlike last year's rainy days, our members have been fortunate to have had some fine days for competition, this season.

This year's 10k was back in the Midland's on a fine day after last year's wet event at Magor. The race provided an undulating course, hosted by the Wolverhampton and Bilston Club, who

Although no British Bests were obtained this time, Sarah Gee (Reading R/R) continued her rich reign of form by getting closest, her 34m-32s ladies race winning time, breaking the course record, was 30 seconds outside Joyce Smith's 20 year old best time for an O/45. Many of the five year age band categories brought out some fine contests for medals though.

The Gold went to Camilla Briggs (Bristol & West) in 37m-12s. The Men's age groups contests were similar in competition. At a recent Executive meeting it was decided to bring the Men's team 10 year age groups in line with the Women's for next year, starting at 35-44, 45-54, 55-64, 65-74, 75+

I personally, after hearing member's views and votes on this, showed my disapproval and recorded a vote against it. The team composition on this decision will now have to be decided at our October delegates meeting.



In fact all the Brits were performing well with Ken Moncreiff M50) jumping 5.21 in the Long Jump and 1.55cm in the High Jump.

In the meantime Dave Burton was steadily accumulating an excellent set of points towards a new British M75 age record. David Haines, Lawrie Dunn and Brian Harlick were also performing well.

The day finished with fine 400m runs from Alastair (56.84) and Claude 57.03 leaving the Brits with a narrow lead over the US.

I was concerned overnight that we might falter on Day 2 with the forecast for cloudless skies and track side temperatures over 100F knowing also that Day 2 is always stronger for the US than Day 1 as they inevitably have excellent Discus / Pole Vault and Javelin competitors.

So it proved although our team pulled back points in the 1500 m despite running these races at the hottest time of the day.

Outstanding performances on Day 2 came from Claude and Alastair in the Hurdles with 16.02 and 16.66 respectively.

Dave Burton crashed in the Hurdles but got up to cross the finish line still scoring points and with his face streaming blood. Whilst this clearly lost Dave several hundred points he was still able to go on and score 5759 points which gave him the M75 record

On the female side Hazel Barker was always struggling to cope with the heat (you don't get many 100F plus days in Leeds!) but was still delighted with her Shot of 10.75 metres on Day 1 but was really worried about being able to complete the 800m on Day 2. Being Hazel and being sensible however saw her battle through.

The result - the US won back the trophy by 43688 to 42317 points.

I have to say that given the heat over the two days I was really proud of the teams performance.

Recovery was then by way of further hospitality (and Softball!)

his was the 5th year with Oxford as the venue and the event drew a record entry of 56 Decathletes (including three ladies!) and 13 Heptathletes.

Fortunately the weather proved more kindly than was forecast and most events on both days were completed in warm and sunny conditions.

The Clarke Cup for the highest age adjusted score in the Decathlon went to Brian Slaughter with 6809 points whilst the Heptathlon equivalent went to Charmaine Johnson with 4670 points.


As expected the highest Decathlon scores came in the very competitive M50 group where Brian Slaughter with 6361 points won from John Mayor with 6215 points.

The only other athlete to top the magic 6000 points marker was Claude Peter-Thomas in winning M45 with 6116 points. It was great to have two lady competitors (Teresa Eades and Margaret Coombe complete a Decathlon and Teresa was awarded the new trophy for the highest scoring lady Decathlete. In the Heptathlon the outstanding performances came from Gaye Clarke with 4601 points in W50, Charmaine Johnson in W40 with 4399 points and Louise Oliver with 4221 points. Closest competition was W35 where Amanda Wale (4068 points) piped Kate Brook by the tiny margin of 66 points. As usual the combined eventers made running the meeting a real pleasure particularly given the large numbers to get through in the High Jump on Day 1 and the Paul Vault on Day 2.



COACHING KIDS! ARE WE REALLY LOOKING AFTER THEM? By Tony Crocker and Bill Davies

A couple of years ago we carried out a survey of British master athletes which was published in Masters Athletics. One of the things we discovered was that roughly a third of our members are heavily involved in coaching, or managing athletics for youngsters. Whilst only a very small proportion of these budding athletes are ever destined to become national or world champions it's pretty clear we all need to take a look at what we can sometimes be accused of - namely, forgetting that is their lives not ours we are supposed to be serving! Unfortunately there is a lot of evidence that this isn't always the case. Although the following recently published researches are focused on those highly talented youngsters who have been identified, negative coaching behaviour can be found at all levels in sport.

Some of the clearest evidence of talented children being bullied comes from the world of sport. Parents, teachers and coaches are all identified as involved, along with evidence of the harm this often causes. Romana Weber, (2009), examined the

harmful effects that can result from the exploitation of children who have been identified as having high levels of talent by the pressures imposed upon them in both training and competition, often for the benefit to the coaches' reputation but also because of national cravings for success and prestigious gold medals. Romana points to the damaging physical and psychological pressures that led to the raising of the minimum age for competitors in the Olympic Games to sixteen in 1997 because of the clear evidence of long lasting damage to many very young world class children. Several national sporting bodies have lied about the ages of their highly talented children - such is the hunger for medal glory at this level. Many top coaches have been found to harass, or punish their elite sporting children - often because their own reputations and income depend on the success of their protégées. The figure skater Yelena Berezhaya, once described how, at age thirteen, she was yelled at and hit by both her coach and her older skating partner. Coaches argue that their behaviour isn't bullying but that their keenness for a child to achieve full potential is misunderstood.

In most areas of sport away from the Olympics minimal age limits do not apply. Medical evidence shows that heavy weights training can seriously damage the bodies of children that are still developing so that it is recommended that this form of training should not be introduced into a youngsters schedule until at least two years after he or she has stopped growing. But success in many sports requires very high levels of muscle power. Current stories about the highly gifted world champion high diving youngster Tom Daley, who has just reached age sixteen, had to withdraw from this year's British Diving Championships because of back problems, Since then he also withdrew from the European Championships and because of fears over risk to his body only dived off the three metre board for ninth place in the first ever Youth Olympics in Singapore in August. Another possibility being suggested is that the damage to his body has been caused by the impact that so much high board diving has had on his young body when hitting the water at high speed. Are we are watching another "Too late" warning not progress a youngster too rapidly whilst his or her body is still developing? Other stories point to talented children regularly given body enhancing drugs, without their understanding what they were.

Bullying can take many different forms. About ten years ago a top premier league British soccer coach, had just signed up 24 young 12/13 year olds that had been spotted by talent scouts during the previous year. He said that the club's policy was to 'throw away about 12 at the end of year one' then throw away another 6 by the end of year two. Those children were all labelled as failures. One of the conditions the boy's families had to agree to was that their son would not take part in any other sports. His attitude was put quite bluntly – "If they can't take pressure from me without crying, they will never survive in the soccer world so I chuck them." Is it really necessary to create a world in which 18 gifted children are treated as failures whilst selecting the six we believe to be the most gifted?

Whilst we were writing this article the 2010 European Championships were taking place in Barcelona. The British teams of elite athletes did rather badly in the relays. Mathew Syad (2010), himself a previous international competitor in the 2000 Olympics, reported in the Times that Van Commenee, could be heard screaming aggressively at the ladies relay team for their botched handing over of their baton. This had led to their failing to make it to the final. He publicly labelled the women as "a disgrace" and the men as "not much better". Every one of those athletes will have been training together for many weeks and trying as hard as they could. Then they where exposed to the massive pressures of a real. important

competition. The emotional and psychological difference between the training and serious world level competitions is enormous. Syad saw Van Commenee's behaviour as being massively destructive. Van Commenee said he needed to be hard in order to improve performances. But the athletes already knew they had failed. They would have already been distressed by that failure. For teachers and coaches to be unable to tell the difference between getting the best from the children we teach, or the athletes we coach and bullying them as a way to achieve that goal would seem to be a major flaw in their value to the athletes they are supposed to be serving. Simple behavioural psychology points out that we all seek those things which give us pleasure, and where possible avoid those things which give us stress. Negative stress does not provide the motive force for achieving the levels of personal performance matched to our potential.

Romana Weber (2009), pointed out how elite young athletes, lose their free time and their social lives. They often suffer immensely from the impact this has on their education, and their health. For many the ambitions of their coaches, their parents and even their countries mean they are exploited. For these youngsters it is the coaches and parents who make most of the decisions. For many the goals are unachievable because their young bodies and young minds can't take the pressures related to intense rigorous training. The huge energy requirement of intensive training doesn't leave enough for normal bodily development. Injuries are often followed by being chased back to too early returns to heavy training. This can lead to permanent harm to the child's body. Kelly Garison competed whilst with stress fractures; Christine Henwick had a broken foot; Nadia Aomeneci had severe blood poisoning. They all had to carry on. Too often top young athletes can lose the freedom to make decisions about their own lives. Long hours of training every day, week after week, year after year with the lure of huge financial payouts to the very few as a constant factor affecting coaches and parents. Jennifer Capreiti was paid over three million dollars, by a sportswear manufacturer, at the age of 13, for example. But very, very few highly talented voungsters achieve anything like this. Many drop out having found the sacrifices they are expected to pay is too high. Jessica Fraser-Thomas, (2008) found that a common causes of dropping out were being trained by only one coach; bullying and short tempered behaviour of coaches; the lack of similar sporting friends during their teenage years; rivalry with their brothers and sisters; over ambitious parents who often tried to coach them when they were in the middle of a competition; and a dramatic falling off of their educational attainments at school. Often the dropout children said they found that their coaches tended to focus on the very best and ignored those they felt were less able. Those who didn't drop out mentioned the fun they had with their coaches and friends, whilst training!

As Cerys Humphreys, (2010), herself a dropout from the Welsh international teenage squad a few years ago, pointed out in a recent article, one of the major reasons that highly talented teenagers in hockey never achieve their potential is because of bullying – whatever alternative/cover-up words coaches, teachers and parents choose to use to defend themselves from accusations about their behaviour and ambitions.

Too often coaches do not follow the *International Olympic Committees Medical Commission's* advice and objectives for safe practices when training elite child athletes. Children of the same age are not all at the same point in their physical development and the disparity between development levels of soft tissues and bone tissues places some elite young athletes at advanced risk. Training should be pleasurable. Perhaps those of us master athletes who still enjoy not only the excitements of doing well, the determination to do better next

time, the social pleasure of meeting other athletes in local, national or international competitions, should also look back to our own teenage years and remember that one reason we are still out there on the track is the wide spread joys we experienced as youngsters. Let's keep it like that.

OBITUARIES

BRYN JENKINS

Dad was born in Saundersfoot South Wales the eldest of four children, Brynmoor, Idabel, Gerwyn and Blanche. He went to school with Guy Gibson later to lead the dambusters raid on Germany during the Second World War. Dad had other aspirations though. His father, a miner by occupation was also the manager and a coach of Saundersfoot football team before the war. Dad fondly told me of kicking a can down the Ridgeway on the way to and from school hiding it in the hedge during the day. Football was his passion then and continued to be through into his forties. In 1938 tragedy struck not just our family, but many others when the mine they were working in flooded and many were killed. One can only imagine the heartache and loss felt especially as an eighteen year old lad Bryn was working on the pit head when his father was killed.

Life was extremely hard and especially so when only eighteen months later dad was called up into the RAF Transport Department and spent the next five years of his life in the Middle East. He continued to play football though and improved to such an extent that he played for the RAF. On leaving the service soon after the war he was offered football terms with Bradford and Arsenal but turned down the offer of these contracts because it did not pay enough for the family. He made the decision then to continue semi professionally whilst also working. Later he continued in the amateur game into his early forties.

Dad met mum, a land army girl, in 1946 whilst stationed near Huntingdon. Typical of dad was his first date invitation when he asked mum if she would like to watch him box. He always was a sportsman...Mum was not too impressed! He must have made amends though because in April 1946 they were married and a year later almost to the day I arrived. This was not quite my recollection as once, at a time when mum and I were travelling by train, two elderly ladies asked me when I was born. I replied the day before my mummy and daddy got married. Icy silence ensued.

Life continued in South Wales until I was about five, when we moved to Huntingdon because of family ill health there. My grandmother was seriously ill. Dad found work as a postman which he was to continue to retirement. It seemed to me at the time as a young boy, that there was scarcely a person in Huntingdonshire dad did not know.

The months, the years continued, so many memories; the highly polished and lovingly maintained motorcycles and motorcycle combinations; trips to Wicksteed Park where we would promenade down the line of equally polished and maintained vehicles quite apart from the other attractions. The many holidays back in Saundersfoot when the journey was much more of an adventure than now as journey times were much longer. Dad would spend days in servicing the motorcycle or car in preparation. Another memory was getting into a car mum was so excited about on the way home from school only to realise a few minutes later it was dad driving our first car. Moving into our first house together. Since leaving Wales we had lived with my grandparents.

It was dad's injuries caused by knocks playing football which finally began to take their toll. Finally dad had to retire from football and for a time a light had gone from his life. I had been running since 1961 and following a challenge from me in 1970 dad entered his first race the traditional St. Neots to Bedford Boxing Day Road Race. Watching him finish that day was a revelation not least for him. A new life was to begin. Steadily he extended and refined his training and soon it was to become evident that he was to excel. The 1970's and 1980's were very special years for both Mum and dad. In and around Huntingdon and St. Ives at the time were a very close and mutually supportive community of athletes and coaches. Dad and I were very much part of that in what proved to be the start of a running boom which continues to this day. Dad became a founder member of Eastern Veterans and was soon competing at a national level successfully. He trained prodigious distances and was so proud to represent Britain as a veteran athlete, eclipsed only it has to be said, by putting on the red vest in representing his beloved Wales. Mum and dad travelled to many parts of the world with British Veterans but perhaps dad is best known for his excellent performances in marathons (under three hours at the age of sixty seven, his wins in Bruges and as World Championship10k age group winner in Vancouver, Canada.

It would be easy to think that dad's life was one dimensional, but he was much more than that. He was both proud and contented in helping mum in her role as the Warden for Rectory Gardens Sheltered Housing for the elderly. He would always look for ways in which he could help people even up until last week. He had so many friends from different walks of life.

God bless you dad.

PETER FIELD 1931-2010 Remembered by Arthur Kimber.

Peter died in June after a long battle with cancer. He was born in London and when he was a boy his family moved to Essex where he took up athletics and joined Southend A.C. After national service in the RAF Peter's work took him to Kent, where he joined Dartford Harriers in 1958. He was one of the stalwarts of the club for over 50 years, holding a wide range of key positions, secretary, treasurer, chairman, president, starter, archivist and historian, and he was made a life member to reward all his sterling work. He was a good chairman and committee man. With his extensive knowledge of athletics he

could put forward his well informed views strongly, but at the same time he was an attentive listener to the views of others. Despite his ill health he finally stepped down as president only in November of last year and up to a few days before his death was still working on his contributions to the history of the club.



During these 50 years he was very active as an athlete. He was a totally committed and dedicated clubman, who would sprint, run middle distance, throw or jump to gain points. His main talent lay in hurdling, where he had a very successful record, particularly as a master athlete. Peter said that he was born just at the right time for masters athletics, as the movement was beginning to gain momentum when he turned 40 in 1971. (Veterans A.C. was set up in 1931, the year of his birth.) He competed in the first master's international meeting in Cologne in 1972 and in the first WAVA championships in Toronto in 1975. As the regional master's athletics clubs began to be founded in the late 1960s and 1970s; Peter enthusiastically became one of the earliest members of SCVAC. Apart from a host of medals at regional and national levels, Peter won 11 individual medals at international championships, 6 gold, 2 silver and 3 bronze. His four best gold's came in two European championships, in Malmo in 1996, where he won both hurdles races, and outstandingly in Poznan in 2006 as an M75, where he took the European record for 300m. Hurdles in a time of 55.81 and the British record with 17.18 for 80m.hurdles.

Peter was well known, widely liked and respected by hundreds of master athletes, as shown by the large attendance at his funeral, and from the many apologies received from athletes who could not attend, having already gone to Nyiregyhaza for the European Championships. He leaves a wife, Elsie, brother, Colin and sister, Joy, and many other family members and

good friends, both in the athletics world and elsewhere. He will be missed very much by them all.

YVONNE WITHERS 1936-2010.

Yvonne was born and brought up in Scotland, before moving south to the Potteries in search of employment.

She officially joined City of Stoke A.C in 1972 initially taking part in a jogging group. Arthur Shaw persuaded her to try Race Walking and she became an integral part of the squad that won the "Midland Blaine trophy" and the "National women's 5k Championship" in 1975.

She became a member of the City of Stroke management committee and was part of the organising committee which promoted the "Women's National cross country championships" in 1977.

When she moved to the West Midlands she joined Dudley and Stourbridge harriers and was part of their very successful Women's walking squad for several years, winning National and Area awards.

Yvonne had remarkable successes in some of the early World and European veteran's championships. She won a W40 silver in at the 5000 metres track walk in and Gothenburg in 1977. The greatest achievement came in the European championships in Helsinki where she took W40 gold in both Road Walks. This was followed by a double bronze at W45 in a Puerto Rico in 1983.

Following her marriage to Denis She again won bronze in the 1989 world championships in the USA.

Unfortunately health problems prevented her continuing competition at this level, but she enjoyed travelling all over the world to Masters Championships with Denis.

While at Stoke she became a qualified track official, and then added a race walking qualification when at Dudley.

Yvonne officiated regularly over a period of more than 30 years, and with Denis helped in many Midland masters promotions

Together they enjoyed all the aspects of athletics, socializing with fellow competitors and officials at the completion of the events.

Yvonne was a talented artist, also enjoyed, gardening, music, bowls and genealogy.

Although her health problems lasted many years, she always made light of it and put on a brave face.
