

All five M80 throws British records were broken this summer, by two athletes who have just moved up to this age group.

Jaroslav Hanus (Barnet) broke the Shot record with a put of 8.92 metres in March, and then threw a Hammer record of 30.82 metres in June, followed by 11.62 metres in the Weight in July.

Hanus also broke the Discus record in July with 24.77 metres, but this distance was further improved in September by Denis Field (Sunderland) with a throw of 25.92 metres and again three days later with 27.05 metres. Field also broke the Javelin record, which had stood since 1986, with a throw of 24.06 metres.

### New Team Scoring System for EVACI and EVACNS 2011

The E.V.A.A Council has decided in agreement with the L.O.C of Ghent and Thionville / Yutz to change the age-groups in these Championships. Following a successful trial period the non-stadia-teams will be scored in five-year groups, rather than the 10 year groups used previously.

The Technical Manual of Ghent (Indoor) and Thionville/Yutz (Non Stadia) will contain this change in team scoring.

Moreover EVAA Council decided that the age group M75 will have its own team scoring.

E.V.A.A Council has decided that the Spanish city of San Sebastian will host the European Indoor Championships in 2013.

In Ghent (BEL), E.V.A.C.I March 2011, the city of San Sebastian and the L.O.C will be present with flyers and information

### ARTHUR KIMBER CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



The last major fixture of the year in November was the British and Irish Masters Cross Country International, this year in Santry Park, Dublin, in much better weather conditions than in Birmingham last year. Closely contested individual and team races contributed to a

very enjoyable day. A full report from Philip Lee follows in this issue.

We have now signed the new contracts with Bourne Sports, our kit supplier, and Corporate and Sporting Events, our travel and accommodation agent. Bridget Cushen, Maurice Doogan, Danny Herman and I met Andrew Bourne in October. The company will provide a new, updated style tracksuit, with other coordinating items, sweatshirts, tee shirts. Polo shirts, rain jackets. and, of course, vests and shorts. All should be available in the New Year and on sale at the national indoor championships in February. The same four Executive members met Lucy Williams from C.S.E. The company will provide early distribution of brochures, a choice of hotels and airports and travel and accommodation packages or accommodation only. We discussed the difficulties that arose in Nyiregyhaza, and C.S.E will aim to avoid such problems in future.

The bid to stage the European Non-Stadia Championships in 2013 is still progressing very slowly Swansea and now Cardiff appear to be out of the picture, but a third Welsh venue, Llandudno, is under consideration. For the World Masters Championships in the Olympic Stadium in 2015, the first problem facing us has now disappeared, as UK Athletics has withdrawn its bid to stage the I.A.A.F World Championships, but there is still uncertainty about the future of the facility. The position should become clearer in the New Year.

In November Irene Nicholls and I met Andy Day, England Athletics Competitions Manager to discuss funding for the Inter Area Track and Field Challenge and the British and Irish masters Cross Country International. The meeting was very productive. For the Inter Area, funding will be provided for track hire, travelling expenses and refreshments for officials, E.D.M for long throws, and possibly, following further discussion, for photo finish and first aid. Again polo shirts will be provided for officials. Whilst for the Cross Country there will be vests and possibly shower proof tops for the England team athletes and expenses for the team managers' selection meeting.

The indoor season will soon be upon us. If you are planning to go to Ghent for the European Indoor Championships make sure to send your entry to Peter Duhig in good time. Entries close on January 15<sup>th</sup>.

I wish you all a Happy Christmas and New Year and an injury- free winter's training.

### SECRETARY'S REPORT BRIDGET CUSHEN



### TRACK & FIELD MAURICE DOOGAN.



**EVACS** Nyiregyhaza, Hungary.

Although, from the medal table, this was a very satisfactory Championship, we were again second in Germany, it was the second time we have taken our gold medal haul above 50, and the highest ever, but in reality it was less golden.

On the organisation side, this was probably the worst International Championship I have been to. The feared lack of qualified officials was evident throughout, and although in the main, all officials were extremely amenable, the inexperience of a large percentage of officials, made the events fraught with difficulties. Valid throws in the Decathlon were being red flagged whilst some invalid throws were white flagged; this was the first sign of problems to come.

The W.M.A seeding, progression and lane draw procedures were not adhered to, and lap counting, even with chip technology failed to be operated satisfactorily. Even though these issues were raised at the daily Team Managers meetings, very little was rectified.

However, probably the worst 'officiating' was the Safety Officer, nicknamed Doctor Death very quickly, whose role had been added to. We were to learn that his role was also being able to pull athletes out of races, if they were going to hold up the next event. This appears to be been decided on by Project 'Safety Officer', which appears to arrive at nonsensical rules without any comprehension of

the consequences, and when it all goes wrong, conveniently the regulators are out for lunch.

The General Assembly was its usual format, very regimented with little discussion on any subject, and although we did force them to listen to our arguments on our two proposals. We were defeated, but not by much [30 for, 40 against with 10 Abstentions], on the issue of increasing the number of members of the Council. The unelected Technical Board of Managers now only meet once a year, so basically appear to have minimal influence on decision making. I was outvoted for the role of E.V.A.A Stadia Manager as expected; they were never going to elect a poacher as the head gamekeeper. At least they cannot accuse me of not offering, when Team Management continue to raise concerns about the repeated areas of disorganisation of Championships. They never learn and insist on reinventing the wheel.

We did however get the Assembly to request Affiliates to provide better treatment of other nation's athletes living and trying to compete in their country. The Minutes show that this was improved to meet DEMANDS.. So a success, of sorts.

However, it is a sad reflection on the politicising of even Masters Athletics that we celebrate such a very minor success. Why do we need to be even raising this kind of issue, in the days of the alleged strength of European Human Rights?

### General Report for 2010.

The Indoor Championships were a great success, as we made a profit, and numbers of entries continue to increase, we had a record 553. We however still have dissent from several athletes, who I have warned, but it appears that some people have not 'appreciated' this, and not only athletes. There has also been objections to the use of MY on this issue, as it is BMAF's, but surely as the T+F Secretary, Meeting Director and Meeting Organiser and general dogsbody, I am entitled to use MY – on the lines of the Queen's WE.

This was followed by another record entry for the Outdoor Pentathlon although the 10K Track race numbers were down. This was probably due to the continual changes to the date of these events, which will now be permanently be joined with the Pentathlon and not the September date with the Decathlon. The heat wave at the time added to the low numbers with a lot of no shows. That being said, we again made a profit on this event. Unfortunately not a precursor for things to come.

The Throws Pentathlon had another record entry, with some very stiff competitions throughout. I was advised by numerous athletes there that due to the recession, the Outdoors move to Cardiff, put it a cost too far. The extra 100 miles each way for most people meant they would be forced to stay overnight and as the hotels in Cardiff are at least £10 per head per night more expensive than Birmingham, they had not entered, so that they could go to Hungary. Please note that this event will be brought in house for 2011. This will mean the purchase of Weight

implements, but we will share these implements with the Area Clubs to enable them to include the Weight competition in their Championships.

The Outdoors at Cardiff, although a very good facility, especially the external throws area and the provision of a combined undercover Call Room - which some athletes still endeavour to avoid - being in a fringe area, will always cause problems with entry numbers. The Call Room problem is either due to the not reading of Athletes Instructions or just being members of the 'Awkward Squad', This meant more disqualifications, although the odd one got through the net, by 'porkies' to Officials. However, we will endeavour to be more diligent, so be warned.

However, the reasons outlined under Throws Pentathlon, together with a lot more officials needing overnight accommodation, shows that Cardiff is a non-viable option for us. Hence, a hopeful return to Alexander Stadium in 2011.

The final Championship of the year, despite clashing with an Executives Meeting, was the Decathlon/heptathlon, another Championship with a record entry, although somewhat light regards the girls. Please note: We had nine M35 entrants and 3 pre-Masters, which shows Mr Duff is not in touch with reality, but was he ever. This fixture also was only just in deficit, which is an expensive Championship to hold, photo-finish required for two days etc., so the future may be not Orange, but still bright. Could it be that the Decathletes were incensed so much by E.V.A.A trying to dump them, that they now fully realise what they have to lose.

So to conclude, the 2010 Championships are now reaching new levels, and despite the expensive blip at Cardiff, not their fault but circumstances, we are virtually where we need to be.

We have almost sufficient high quality officials at all levels, for all of our Championships, which enables them to run to programme and be conducted more than adequately [not perfectly, but for a control freak like me that is unachievable], which with the numbers of athletes involved is no mean feat. These officials actually want to work with us, not because I [we] work them to death, which unfortunately I have to, but mainly because we look after them and their concerns are ours - they are friends rather than Officials. The vociferous e-mails from numerous officials, who spotted that the Inter City Challenge match was trying to nick our booking at Lee Valley was amazing. That is some change from the attitude of officials towards Veterans some ten or more years ago. This must be down to how you athletes conduct yourself, so well done and thank you. However we are not all perfect, so I need your help to police affairs, so that we set the Gold Standard for behaviour and conduct.

We are also at venues that want us and that have all the necessary facilities. OK, the Alexander Stadium outside Throws Area is not first class, but only on our benchmark. The mud bath in Hungary, and International

venues elsewhere for that matter, make Brum's fade into insignificance.

Have a good winters training and I hope to see more of you at the forthcoming Indoor Championships, as well as the European Indoor and Non-Stadia Championships in Ghent and Thionville.

### ROALD BRADSTOCK INTERVIEW JULY 2010 by Alastair Aitken



ROALD BRADSTOCK at 48, followed up his eighth place in the Javelin at the European Trials & UK Championships, at Birmingham with 65.17 by going on to win in the M45 Javelin in the British Masters Championships at Cardiff International Stadium, on the 3rd of

July. On each of his throws he easily bettered the Championship Best of 55.47 (60.59; 60.31; 63.78, 64.92; 63.92; and 61.62). The wind was very strong and blustery when he threw, with all the '35 to 50's "I had not thrown in training for a couple of weeks because I was nursing a few little injuries. My focus is all on next year and I am going home on Thursday to the U.S.A to start my preparation.' At Cardiff he experimented with the wind as he said 'The javelin is an aerodynamic implement whereas, a discus thrower knows exactly where the wind is. Many javelin throwers have not got a clue about that. They go out the middle where the wind is the same every time. I am changing height, changing distance and changing angles. It was the first time I have done 'Masters' so doing the best I could on the day. I was having fun, playing around with the wind. In training I would do that rather than in competition where I was under pressure. You can change your approach by about 30 or 40 degrees' He added 'I have thrown so often I can do that in my sleep' He continued ' my goal is to smash the M50 World record of 71.01 with a 700 gram javelin. The way I throw I could do that. My javelin throwing looks very technical but it is very simple. A lot of spin round the rotation. What I look for is a strong cross wind.'

Roald pointed out 'my aim is to do my eighth Olympic trial in the UK (He did do three US Olympic Trials in his time). At the UK trials I would be one step away. Who knows what happens there so, my main goal is to make

the 2012 Olympic Trials, on my home turf Broxbourne where I am from. A nice end to my career and come a full circle. That was why I went to the States to see the Olympics and for my ART.

Regarding his Art and what he does in that direction he replied 'You name it! I am using paintings or traditional mediums or videos' He has been doing that in workshops and Sporting Colleges'

He is dubbed 'The Olympic Picasso' in 2003 he won the prestigious International Sports artist of the Year award. His art is exhibited in the International Olympic Museum in Lausanne as part of the cultural activities that lead up to the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games. Perhaps the most astonishing thing of all is how he came to do athletics at all. First of all he was born on the 24th of April 1962 in Hertford Heath, Herefordshire and his mother is Norwegian.

'In 1968 as a six year old in the year I was diagnosed with spina bifida and, they told me from x-rays that they did not know why I could walk. I was not to play sport so, I could not play rugby. It was at that time I watched the Mexico Olympics on a black & White TV in my parent's kitchen. I got the excitement from that and, get goose pimples just thinking about it still. That was what I wanted to be a **javelin thrower'** (The 1968 Olympic javelin was won by Latvian Janis Lusis with 94.58).

Who then did Bradstock admire as a great javelin thrower and he was emphatic about that.

'Niklos Nemeth (1976 Olympic Champion with a WR of 94.58) the way I throw is based on his technique, that rotation. I knew that I had a weak back so I had to come up with something technically where I could lengthen my form in order to throw further to reduce the strain on my back. I looked at him and, always knew that, if I stay healthy it should allow me to have a very long career and, I am still here.' he then commented 'The Mystery of the Javelin Community. I have a short approach, old, balding and wearing colourful outfits!'

He said the first year he felt he had broken through 'It was in 1978 at club meets. At Hastings I threw 66 metres and then 72.72 at the Southern Counties thirty years ago.'

Coming forward to this year he threw, almost the same distance of 71.22 for a British Masters M45 record, on April the 17th in Athens Georgia, USA.

In 1984 he was 7th in the Olympic Final with 81.22 and he was in the Seoul Olympics in 1988 where he threw 75.96.

Back in 1985 he had his furthest ever mark of 91.40 which he did on May the 3rd in Texas then, on the 27th of July '85 he won the javelin competition in the Bislet Games in Oslo with 90.58.

What did he consider his greatest performance? 'My best competition was Bislet 25 years ago."

### News from England Athletics Masters Association

E.A.M.A congratulates all the competitors who donned the England vest for the 23<sup>rd</sup> British and Irish Masters Cross-country, hosted this year by the Republic of Ireland in Dublin on 13<sup>th</sup> November, excellent individual and team results as you will see from the separate report by Phil Lee. Thank you to Team Managers, Harry & Kim and to the Selection Committee.

At their October meeting E.A.M.A agreed to add a Vice Chairperson to their Committee and are now seeking a candidate at their A.G.M in Birmingham on 26 March 2011. The Committee is quite small – Chaired by Irene Nicholls, Secretary Bridget Cushen, and Treasurer Danny Mullane. Eric Horwill looks after the walkers, Arthur Kimber the Track & Field side; Harry Matthews has come on board as Cross-Country Secretary and prolific road runner. Alex Rowe has found the time to devote to the position of Road Running Secretary. As you can see, we are all active members still competing or Officiating. We only have two Committee meetings per year plus the A.G.M and an extra person on board in the role of Vice Chair would fit in nicely as they would deputise for Irene and or help out the Event Secretaries as necessary. If you are interested, get your club to nominate you or if you need any further information, please let us know.

In his first year as Road Running Secretary, Alex staged England Inter-Area awards at 5km and 10km which were incorporated within the B.M.A.F events at Horwich in June and Goodrich in September. At Horwich we had 100 runners, 77 men and 23 women. John Parker M35 of Midland Masters won the men's race outright in 15:37 and Gill Harrison the women's in 18:48min. There were 10 teams in all; N.V.A.C won the M40. M50 and M70 age groups with the M60 going to the S.C.V.A.C. There were 4 M60 and 3 M50 teams with 1 apiece in the M40s and M70s. The N.V.A.C won the W55 team award. In the 10k at Goodrich we had 141 entries and although Alex had to work quickly to abstract the Inter Area Team results, some medals had to be posted as athletes had already left. Gordon Lee was the men's winner in the M40 age group with a swift 31:18. Sarah Gee was outstanding in winning the women's race as a W45 in 34:32. There were 11 men's teams, with Midland Masters winning the M35-49, NVAC the M50 and M70 and SCVAC the M60 team. The women had 5 teams, with Midland winning W35 and W55 and SCVAC W45. The organisers were very good in giving Alex an electronic copy of the results which he was able to use for the team results. No Inter Area individual medals are awarded for this event.

Eric Horwill is also looking at the possibility of an Inter-Area walk, possibly also at Horwich and he is working on the England v Ireland walking match for next year.


### RECORD BREAKING IN DUBLIN

British and Irish Masters Cross

hen **Mike Hager** won the **M60** race he became the most successful race winner at the cross country International with 10 wins. With the way he is running who would bet against him adding to that total in the future.

The British and Irish Masters Cross Country International was run at Santry Demense in Dublin. Adjacent to the course is the Athletics Track on which **Herb Elliot** broke the world mile record in August 1958. Elliot's time was 3.54.5. Irishman, Ron Delaney also broke the existing world record when he finished second in 3.55.9. But who had been the previous world record holder?

England successfully held onto the trophies for Men and Women but were pushed much closer by hosting nation Republic of Ireland on a relatively flat but sticky course after overnight rain. As always there were some individual performances of note but also some extremely close racing to determine age group winners.

The first race of the day started in bright sunshine with a group of runners making an initial break from the pack. Included in

this group were Melissa Whyte (Scot), Annette Kealy, Donna Mahon and Mary Scully (Rol) and the England contingent of Sarah Wilkinson, Claire Martin, Emma Stallard and Claire Elms. As the race progressed over the four laps the group continued to interchange places. The race was won by Claire Martin W35 (22.07) who had dictated the pace for the entire race. She was followed home by Emma Stannard W40 (22.21) and Melissa Whyte W45 (22.26)



W35 Claire Martin Eng had opened up a gap on the rest of her age group by Lap 1. Further back Donna Mahon, Mary Scully Rol, Cathy McCourt NI were fighting for the other medal places. On the final lap they were being closed down by Camilla Briggs Eng. At the finish it was very close between the Republic of Ireland women.



W50 England did a clean sweep for the medal places in this age group. Monica Williamson and Sue Becconsall were involved in the fight for the gold medal. The race for the bronze medal was much more disputed between Anne Luke Eng, Ruth Magill NI, Anne Donnolly, Mags Greenan and Mary Sweeney all from the Republic of Ireland. ### OLDBURY POWER STATION TEN (inc. the BMAF Championships) REPORT: MEL JAMES

After commenting on how this year's road running events were blessed with fine weather in my Goodrich 10k report, I may have jinxed the ten mile championships. Oldbury-on-Severn was deluged with overnight storms. The village of Oldbury is within twenty miles of the Ryder Cup golf venue (separated by the river Severn) and received the similar storms that cancelled the morning's play there. Luckily the rain stopped during our event.

Oldbury is a very fast course for PB's and many of the course records were broken on the day. The race winner Michael Johnson (Cardiff) proved this, by smashing the 21 year old existing course record, running 50m-19s. (Unfortunately for him, he is too young to join the Masters) Four of our members now hold records there though.

In the o/65 women's category Sandra Poole (Holme Pierrepoint) knocked an astonishing 14mins off the existing best. Martin Ford (Cheltenham) continued his good form and took a huge 6mins off the o/65 men's best. Walter McCaskey and William Davies, also now hold the o/75 and o/80 course records.

Such is the high standard of the existing British bests, none were obtained at Oldbury.

At the front end of the race there were some interesting battles taking place between the o/40's and o/45's mixed in with the open race runners. Stephen Male (Oxford City AC) o/45 led the masters home in 54m-19 secs. with Austin Davies o/45 (Brecon AC), just holding off Chris Hollinshead o/40 (Stafford Harriers) by 4 secs for second place. Further down the field, as our masters get older, the categories grow larger in their composition, this attributes to some very competitive racing and it is heart warming to see the strong depth in standard of our athletes. There were close finishes in the o/55's, o/70's and o/75 men's categories for the Gold medals. In the Women's section there weren't so many close battles and the entries were thinner on the ground, only the o/40's and o/60's finished with three medallists. Only twelve women in total completed the race. First Women home was Jenny Carter o/35 (Team Bath) in 62mins-16secs. The team competition, is sadly, not competitive anymore. Any reasons, suggestions or comments on this, would be constructive for the future. Only one men's and one women's team finished and they both requested to down age before the race. There would not have been any scoring age group teams otherwise. The men's team winners were Tipton Harriers o/35's (Laurence Heathcock, Richard Brittain and

Raymond Stanier). The women's team winners also o/35

were Team Bath AC, (Jenny Carter, Margaret Thompson and Janice Rambridge). (It was also fantastic to see Margaret's husband, the great Ian Thompson also competing in the event).

There are no team events in the BMAF Half and Full Marathon Championships and if the team event is not well enough contested in the 10 mile event, there is a risk of losing it.

Please note the Men's age groups are changing from next year. They will be 35 to 44, 45 to 54, 55 to 64, 65 to 74 and 75+. (The composition of team members is not yet decided on).

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Thornbury AC for hosting our event, which overall was a very successful day.

I was amazed to discover on the women's 400 metres lists that Tracey Swindell had recorded a fantastic 52.79 seconds for the distance some 89/100's of a second faster than the existing World Record of 53.68 seconds currently held by Sara Montecinos of Chile.

As this was news to me, I wondered why I had not heard of this wonderful feat, which would have put Tracey seventh on the UK seasons lists just behind Nicola Saunders.

Cross checking on the American track and field season's lists, confirmed that the performance should have been credited to America's Tiara Swindell, and Tracey had not after all achieved for Britain a Women's 400 world record.

I mailed the I.AA.F., who duly acknowledged a mistake had been made on the top performance lists.

Nice to see Larry Achike who I first saw as a promising Junior at Crawley in the British League, heading the World Masters Triple Jump listings.

Joice Maduaka who competed in the Deli Commonwealth Games heads the Masters lists at 200 metres, and Helen Clitheroe and Jo Pavey lead the lists for 1500 and 10,000 metres.

His dedication was acknowledged with a Life Membership of the Association.

Over the last twenty years plus, club nights were spent with Ken, enjoying his customary glass of red wine alongside the other "vets" in the aptly named "Wrinkles' Corner" of the club, where we discussed how we could put the world to right.

Our thoughts and prayers go out his family, his devoted wife Mavis, "behind every great man there is great woman" and Mavis certainly fits that role, also his two daughters, Yvonne and Jennifer and their families, on this very sad occasion.

He will long be remembered, with affection and respect, by all that knew him.


