BVAF CC CHAMPIONSHIP, OCTOBER 6th, SINGLETON PARK, SWANSEA



ome rain, come shine' was the catchphrase as delayed the 2001 **BVAF** Cross Country championships finally got under way over an undulating course made tougher by recent heavy rain. Although the overall women's winner, Sheila Allen, com-plained about the heat, M40 champion Julian Critchlow would have had more cause to comment about the deluge that saturated the field midway through the final race.

First away was the women's all-age group event over two-and-a-bit laps of the park. BVAF 10km champion Alison Hirst was off the pace on the first lap, as the over-40's ruled the roost. Sheila Allen, as ever, was first up the opening hill, followed by 1999 champion Viv McConnell and Frances Gill, W40's both, and the pattern of the race was established.

After a lap, the three still led, as the W35's were content to let their older sisters do the work. Leisa Lavender, Sharon Coyne and Hirst were all close enough to challenge for overall

victory, but it was Allen, 1996 champion, who broke clear on the final lap to win by 30 yards. McConnell, 45 a few days later, was a clear second but, in the rush for the line, Hirst got up for third and the W35 gold, while Gill, Coyne and Lavender followed.

Chiltern Harrier Josie Heffernan was always well clear of the W50's and only one W45, eventual group winner Sue Cooper, headed the veterans' cycling world-champion, who was chased home by W55 winner Pat Gallagher. Anne Roden, 55 a couple of weeks later, was second W50, while the W65 winner Pam Jones headed all the W60's.

With the race being run in glorious sunshine, winner Allen said: "It was hard but it was the heat that was difficult". Hirst followed up her 10km victory with another W35 gold and was philosophical about being beaten by older runners: "I tried to start sensibly then pick it up". The Headington runner also revealed that her main aim had been to make the England squad for the International at Falkirk.

John Taylor, the double world road champion from Malta back in May, headed the over-70's which was run in conjunction but they were a bit lost in a big women's field. Perhaps the time has come to run them in a separate race?

Julian Critchlow had taken a fine silver in Malta but here won his first BVAF medal, as the weather changed during the afternoon. The Watford Harrier, who a week later was to become the first veteran to win a race in Division 1 of the Chiltern League, was up the opening hill ahead and that was how it stayed. Throughout the four laps and four further climbs, the 40-year-old was never troubled. Even the downpour only served to whet his appetite for the task.


Expected contenders Mark Burnhope, Steve Murdoch, Martin Rees, Steve Brace and Andy Wilton were all there but were peeled away as the race wore on, leaving Critchlow 150 yards clear, a margin that was reduced only on the final circuit, a parade lap for the new champion. Of his lead the winner said: "When you are in a

position like that you can't lose it," before admitting that his "main aim was to get in the top two" to ensure England selection for the international.

Andy Wilton had a good second half to take M40 silver, while former overall winner Dave Neill also came through. Fell runner Neill upset the M45 favourite, Martin Rees on his home course, to snatch the gold while minor medals went to leuan Ellis and Murdock.

The M50 to 69 event saw Peter Hyde lose for the first time in his five year tenure in the group. Graham Tuck made a welcome return to top class competition. The Isle of Wight milkman who was out of the sport for ten years after a series of knee operations but who had kept himself fit on his milk round, revived the same 'blast it from the front' tactics that used to be the forte of the Tuck twins. Brother Grenville has remained in the sport over the years and was the better in their senior international days back in the early 70's but had no answer as Graham blasted up the opening hill.

Going further away, the for-



mer Inter-County fifth placer (1972) was not to be caught. Owen Lewis and Brian Lloyd did their best but their chase was only for the silver and bronze.

Graham Wootton has been looking for his first BVAF cross-country title for many-a-year, despite taking a first place in the Vets' International. Perhaps it is the time of the year that suits best but the Woodford man had no trouble, winning by 18 seconds from the ever-consistent Hugh Arnold.

Thinking that his membership of Vets AC would see him in the England team for Falkirk, Arnold was pleased with his effort, but word later had it that his membership had lapsed!

Fred Gibbs overturned his defeat at the hands of Les Presland in the road 5km at Milton Keynes a month early, by sticking to the Aldershot man throughout the race for the M60 title, before pouncing near the end for a narrow victory. Favourite Keith Spacie was never in trouble in the over-65 event, going on to beat Dennis Hayes by nearly 150 yards.

BVAF CC RELAY CHAMPIONSHIPS, OCTOBER 27th, DARLINGTON

Philip Lee, BVAF CC Secretary reports that the BVAF CC Relays were

POORLY SUPPORTED -FIERCELY COMPETITIVE

n a flat, grassland course the 6th National **BVAF** Country Cross Relays Championships were held in Darlington on a sun-drenched Saturday, October 27th. Although not many clubs supported the event, perhaps due to the close proximity of the Country **BVAF** Cross Championships on the 6th October, some international runners used it as a training opportunity before competing in the International CC in Falkirk.

Ron Hill Cambuslang made the long journey from Scotland with a strong squad and ran away from the opposition to win the Men's 40+ title. Bingley Harriers completed a double by winning the Men's 50+ and titles. Local team Houghton and Peterlee won the W35+ title while Clayton-le-Moors Harriers was the only club to compete in the W55+ event. Supporting all the races, the Clayton-le-Moors club was rewarded with a first, a second and two third places.

WOMEN 35+

With only two teams this was not going to be an exciting race but Anna Kelly of Clayton-Le-Moors went into an early lead and was over one minute ahead after the first leg. However, strong running by Kelly Bentley (15.33) and Sheila Allen (13.48) over the next two legs ensured that Houghton and Peterlee finished over four minutes ahead of their rivals.

WOMEN 55+

Clayton-Le-Moors found that they were the only club to contest this age group but nevertheless gave it 100% and deserve their title. Hopefully next year will be better (*Editor*).

MEN 40+ 1st LEG

The surprise of this race was that after the first leg, Ron Hill Cambuslang were down in 5th. The race was led by Darlington Harriers for whom Nigel Orr had put in a fast run of 11.56 for a 15 second lead over Tony Chewd of Clayton - Le - Moors. Rob Rush of Sunderland Harriers, Tony Mellor of North Shields Poly and Gerry Reid of RHC had opened up a gap on the rest of the field.

2nd LEG

For local club Darlington their moment of glory was over. They were quickly over taken by the clubs breathing down their necks. Dave Dymond of RHC, put in a fast 12.02 lap and was in front at the end of the second leg.

3rd LEG

The positions of the first four remained unchanged on third leg although Ronnie Bruce with a 12.03 leg increased RHC's lead over Sunderland. Adrian Rusworth of Bingley Harriers put in a strong run to take 5th place as Darlington slid back to 7th. Phil Lancaster, an M60 England International ran in the M40 race to put in a creditable 13.23 leg for North Shields Poly. This time would have given him the third fastest time in the M60 race.

4th LEG

The first four places remained the same but the fastest leg of the day, 11:46 by Colin Donnelly, increased RHC's advantage over its nearest rivals. A 11.58 run from Mark Aspinall helped Clayton-Le-Moors to close to within 11 seconds of second placed Sunderland. Bingley's stay in the top five ended when a leg of 13.08 from Jon Ireland enabled Kingston upon Hull to swap places with Bingley.

5th LEG

The RHC machine drove relentlessly on as Frankie Barton put in the fastest leg 5 time of 12.13 to further increase their lead. Sunderland and Clayton-Le-Moors continued to battle it out for second place with John Watson's 12.45 against Paul Brannon's 12.58 slightly increasing Sunderland's lead. Further down the field, Kevin Dobson ran 13.03 compared to the 13.37 from Steve Milson and Bingley and Kingston upon Hull swapped places.

6th LEG

With a lead of over 2 minutes only a miracle could stop Ron Hill Cambuslang winning the M40+ race and miracles were in short supply in Darlington that day. With the 3rd fastest leg overall, Ross Arbuckle (11.51) put in another quick circuit of the now muddy course to further increase the lead and to bring RHC home three minutes ahead of their nearest rivals. Sunderland in turn held off the efforts of Clayton-Le-Moors Harriers. An 11.48 leg from Steve Robinson - the second fastest of the race - could not help Bingley Harriers to close the gap on fourth-placed North Shields Poly.

MEN 50+

Although only nine clubs took part in the Men 50+ race, the excitement was not diminished - at the end only twenty-one seconds separated the first three teams.

1st LEG

Gordon Wilding's leg of 13.16 ensured that Steel City Striders led the first leg from Bingley's Neil Robson who had put in a 13.20 while Ian Richardson was third for North Shields Poly with 13.36. Only 16 seconds separated the first five teams.

2nd LEG

Steel City Striders maintained their lead over Bingley but a strong run from Keith Elliott - 13.02 the fastest of the leg - moved Sunderland up from sixth to third place. A 13.42 run by Jim Robinson raised Richmond and Zetland to fourth from seventh.

3rd LEG

This was the leg when the slumbering giant awoke and the race was thrown completely on its head. Elswick Harriers had been running in 8th and 6th places for the first two legs, nearly a minute and a half down on the leaders. Then Jimmy Bell entered the fray and, with the fastest overall lea of 12.19, took over a minute out of the teams in front. So devastating was this run that Elswick moved into second place. Up front Bingley was also putting on the pressure and a 13.14 leg from G. Bell had moved them into first place while Sunderland kept grip onf third place. The losers were Steel City Striders, dropping to fourth place and Clayton-Le-Moors who went to seventh.

4th LEG

With only 35 seconds separating the first four teams the fourth and final leg looked to be a cracker. It certainly lived up to expectations. England International Harry Mathews was running the final leg for Elswick and eating into P. Probin's 21 seconds lead with every stride and the watching crowd waited with baited breath. Coming into the last 400 metres, Mathews was obviously gaining with every stride but Probin had enough strength left to hold off the final challenge and lead Bingley to victory by the slender margin of 4 seconds. Further down the

kill differs from technique which is basically patterns of movement; skill enters into other areas and could be described as technique applied to a competitive situation. A good technique in training may not convert into a good skill in the

Coaches need to have knowledge of:

competitive situation.

● the event and its technical demands ● the athlete's capabilities and potential ● the techniques used by other successful athletes ● relevant and varied coaching progressions

There are many definitions of skill; in athletic terms it consists of the ability to bring about an end result with maximum certainty and minimum outlay of energy or of time and energy, therefore the athlete seeks to achieve a well-defined goal by:

 maximising the achievement certainty ● minimising physical/mental energy costs of the performance ● minimising the time taken

There are 3 critical elements to the mastery of skill:

perceiving the relevant environmental features deciding what/where and when to do it
 producing organised muscular activity to generate movements

We must now classify skills. It is generally accepted that, without being too complicated, we should define two classifications as: Open and Closed.

Open: the environment is variable and unpredictable; sports such as football, wrestling, basketball and tennis.

Closed: the environment is stable and - fairly - predictable; sports such as archery, swimming, gymnastics and lane sprinting in athletics.

We do, perhaps, need to

enlarge on these classifications just a little. Skills can be discrete, ie: easily defined beginning and ending and of brief duration, the classic example would be the clean and jerk in weightlifting. They can, of course, be continuous with no particular beginning or end and can last for a considerable time, examples would be long distance swimming, marathon running etc.

Other classifications could be grouped as Motor skills; skills involving quality of movement and subsequent decision of that motor skill action as in Long and High Jump. Perhaps, not of too great importance to an athlete but we must not forget Cognitive skills where decisions are critical - the classic example would be a chess or snooker player. At this stage, do not confuse cognitive skills with tactical consideration, that's another story!

So what are the factors in acquiring skills?

There are five main categories, with in some cases sub divisions:

Arousal - coaches and athletes will be aware of the 'inverted U principle', basically increased arousal improves performance but only to a point, after which any further

increase in arousal would be seen to degrade performance. As coaches and athletes we have all observed the 'over the top' parent. It must be said that the same can apply to coaches.

Attention is serial, that is, it shifts from source to source over time and is limited in capacity, it is effortful and directly related to arousal. It can have a serious effect on co-ordination and can limit the capacity to perform certain parts of tasks together. Only the advanced coach/athlete would 'mix' technique and speed in the same coaching session, I am particularly thinking of hurdle events.

Memory - simply the storage of various information and the process thereof. This does need to be subdivided into Short Tem Memory, which as the name implies is limited in capacity and held only as long as attention is directed to it, eg: centering.

Long Term Memory is the process of very well learned information gathering over time (ever tried to learn a language?). Of course, there is a process in place that allows a switch between STM to LTM either simultaneously or over time

Visual skills are very impor-

tant, one especially so for foot-ball/rugby players is 'optical flow' which provides for stability and balance leading to the 'eye on the ball' theories. Another is the vital need in some sports for visual dominance and visual capture, eg:. The golfer who must keep his head still, concentrating on the ball whilst he controls the rest of his/her body. Snooker players are masters of this skill.

To the disbeliever, it is always pertinent to show a short example of motor skills, by way of a simple limb test. Using a well-known palindrome ask your athlete to write "Able was I ere I saw Elba" with his or her dominant hand and time the action: also check for Then ask them to quality. repeat this with the non-dominant hand, time it and compare quality. They could also try it with the pen in their mouth. Why this test? It demonstrates that although their memory is the same, the learned skill is not - it may even be nonexistent.

In this brief summary on the acquisition of skill we must consider the accuracy/quality aspect. In technical terms, we are guided by Fitts Law, which states:

'Movement time is linearly related to the index of movement difficulty'

Translated that means that, basically, haste makes waste or faster is less accurate. So we must balance newly acquired skills to effect a speed/accuracy trade off - in football terms, short passes are more accurate than long passes.

Finally and, probably, most importantly, do not confuse Ability with Skill. Ability could be genetic and, whilst certainly helping in acquiring skills, must not be confused with skill. Skill always comes with practice.

M60+ 1st LEG

Seven teams competed in this three leg relay. Morpeth Harriers went into an early lead thanks to a 14.40 leg from Walter Ryder but only 30 seconds separated the first five

teams. Hallamshire Harriers were in second place, a position they were destined to occupy throughout the race.

2nd LEG

Bingley Harriers moved into the lead after John Firth put in a 14.24 leg, the second fastest of the race. Meanwhile local rivals Gosforth and Morpeth fought out a battle for fourth spot as Stuart Jarvis moved Clayton-le-Moors up to third spot with 15.15, the second fastest time on this leg,

3rd LEG

Bingley led by 47 seconds which, with Fred Gibbs executed a quick 13.22 leg, meant that the race, with only 24 seconds separating the next three teams, was for the minor medals. The fastest leg of the race, 12:27 by Bob Toogood,

It wouldn't be right to simply provide information about next year's bi-annual GB v USA Multi-Events Challenge Match, writes John Charlton, without reference to the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington. A matter of hours before the tragic events, I telephoned Tom Thorne on Monday evening, 10 September, to confirm 20th and 21st July 2002 as the dates for the match. I later found out that Tom's son Tim, who many readers will have met at previous matches in the US, had been called up as a Military Reservist for duty in Egypt. Tom asked for you to pray Tim and other Us servicemen during these difficult times.

Seeing the television pictures of the Twin Towers being hit and collapsing and the carnage that followed will stay with us forever but Tom's simple request to pray for his son who has been called to war really brings home the enormity of the consequences of the worst terrorist attack in history.

Transatlantic flying will clearly never quite be the same again after the events of 11 September 2001 but Tom and I are determined that we must continue these GB v USA matches which have brought so much friendship and comararderie between British and American people.

With such a background, I would ask all multi-eventers to participate next year in the GB v USA Challenge Match and

put on the best competition possible as a mark of respect for our friends in the USA.

The Challenge Match will double as the 2002 BVAF Decathlon and Heptathlon Championships and will be held at Woodbourne Road Stadium, Sheffield on Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 July 2002. The date has been set to suit our American quests whose school holidays start earlier than ours, many go back from mid August onwards. A date after the European Pentathlon was therefore not feasible and I reasoned that a good month would be necessary between the Challenge March and the European Pentathlon August) to recover and compete well in Potsdam. The date also avoids the BVAF Track and Field Championship.

OBITUARY



Welsh athletics was saddened by the death of D a v e Williams in October. For the past four years he was

the Chairman of the Welsh Veterans Association and took an active part in running Welsh Athletics. Dave was a Cardiff AAC senior coach and over the years had worked with several Welsh international athletes, including Bernie Plain. For eleven years he was the manager of the Welsh team and led them at the Commonwealth Games at Edinburgh in 1986 and Auckland in 1990. He also the successful managed Cardiff British League team in the 1970s. During latter years he embraced veteran athletics and his knowledge and friendship will be greatly missed.

PROFILE

SELF-MADE WORLD CHAMPION

Howard Moscrop had reached his late-30s and was contemplating giving up athletics. **Alastair Aitken** relates how the double World champion came to carry on.

OWARD MOSCROP entered veteran athletics with a bang. The Maths teacher grabbed the BVAF Indoor M40 400m title with a 52.17 run in 1999, beating Alan Harrison (second with 52:90) and rival and friend, Mike Coker (53:37).

Moscrop carried his indoor form to Gateshead and the WAVA Championships, winning one of that year's most exciting finals. Peter Grimes (USA) was the firm favourite for the 400m hurdles after demonstrating a smooth and professional display of hurdling in the heats. Grimes went away from the start, trying to improve on the existing World record of 52.7; however, Grimes had underestimated the tremendous fighting spirit of Howard Moscrop. The UK athlete started to put pressure on the American in the back straight and came off the last hurdle ahead, giving Grimes no chance to retaliate. Moscrop 53:20; 2nd Grimes

Last year Moscrop regained the World title in Brisbane. (1st Moscrop 55:31; 2nd Blanco [ESP] 55:40; 3rd Hermann [GER] 58:57.) Howard Moscrop, father of four (oldest 9), explained: "I was not initially going to the World Championships but the school kindly gave me a week off so I was able to do the 400m hurdles".

Moscrop came into athletics at Secondary school but it was not until 1976 that he started to enjoy doing the sport.

"It was probably when I went to Loughborough to do Physical Education and Maths that I took it a little bit more seriously. I decided that I wanted to do athletics alone when I left Loughborough. There I had been playing football at county standard as well but I realised you cannot do both."

Howard Moscrop was born in Ripon, Yorkshire but spent a lot of his early years in Brighton, competing for Brighton & Hove AC and then Crawley AC before settling down with Swindon. His father Brian was a cricketer and his mother Sawyer a swimmer which did not hinder his interest in competitive sport.

It was after Loughborough, filling in for someone in the 400m hurdles a couple of times, that it dawned on him that he could become a hurdler.

"I found I had a nice sort of rhythm and my hurdling developed from there."

He nearly made the Commonwealth Games in 1982, finishing sixth in the final selection race.

"Through most of the 80s, I got medals in the UK and Southern Championships. I was in the top 10 for two or three years and then the top 20 or so for the rest of the 80s - that was the limit of my achievements."

Moscrop also ran the high

hurdles in a windy 14.6 and 14.8 in the early 80s but now thinks "I suffered from not having any serious coaching. A lot of it was self-determined. There are a number of things I picked up that I have used in my later years and that is why I am still running fairly good times. It is because I am learning from previous experiences".

Howard's lifetime 400mH best is 51:4 from 1984; he ducked under 52 seconds in 1982 and then every year through to 1986. After that "I went off the boil. We moved to the Forest of Dean in Gloucestershire where it was a long way to a track and motivation was difficult. I moved through job changes and joined Swindon AC in 92 or 93".

Although Moscrop was still able to run 54 to 55 seconds when he was 37-years-old he debated whether he should give up athletics. Then two sig-

nificant things happened.

One, he joined Swindon AC when the club was doing well in the Southern League and enjoyed the competition against younger athletes in the friendly club environment.

Two: he realised that people like Mike Coker whom he had run against for years were doing veteran competition.

So Howard plunged into veteran athletics and two world titles followed.

However, Moscrop is modest about his abilities: "The problem with a lot of my training is that I have not got a lot of natural speed. My training is endurance based with quite a lot of weights and circuit training - physically demanding in that context rather than sprint oriented. But I can keep going".

SOUTHERN COUNTIES VAC

Club members surpassed theirselves at the Abingdon Marathon on October 21st. with 2nd, 3rd and 4th places overall. Out of a large field that also served as the RRC Championships and included many top class distance runners, Tim Jones finished second in 2:38:18 with Brian Vaughan 3rd in 2:38:40 and Godfrey Rhymes fourth in 2:42:04. Walter Hill was also well up with 2:50:10 to win the RRC M45 championship, while John Borland was again first M70 just outside 4 hours.

This being the penultimate event of the "Grand Prix" series, the scene was set for the grand finale at Harrow a week later where the Half Marathon championship would settle the issues. Although Pam Jones was deemed to be invincible in the Women's event, her Ilford AC teammates Owen Phipps and Martin Clarke were locked in mortal combat; the former leading with 129 points but with the latter just 3 points behind. Although Clarke was faster on the day with 82:41, Phipps' 83:55 converted to 81.84% to secure the series. Cliff Keen was first M40 in 75:48 for an AGP of 82.45%.

Pam Jones eclipsed this with an 86.46% performance which meant that she had only dropped three points in the series with 197 out of 200. Marion Rayner also made a welcome return to form with a sterling 93:21 to win the W50 overall prize, in addition to the Club gold medal, a feat also achieved by Tony Merritt in M60.

With the Club AGM looming, the best award Trophies - also determined by age gradings - have now been finalised and as usual the track performances have, with one notable exception, proved to be superior to the field. As in 2000, Jennie Matthews was adjudged the best female track performer for her 400 metres Hurdle time of 61.1 which, at age 39, converts to 93.48%. Her runners up were those excellent sprinters, Val Parsons whose 13.93 100 metres at 55 equated to 91.60% and Helen Godsell whose 13.17 at 47 was worth 91.11%.

Jon Browne who equalled the M45 100 metres world record of 11 seconds earlier in the season, found that his 98.36% at age 47 was just too good for the rest with the 2000 winner Dave Willcocks - 1:57:91 at the same age next with a mere 96.72%!

Both Men's and Women's Jumps suffered by comparison, although Alan Williams' 4.20 Pole Vault at age 48 was judged to be worth 87.86%, with Ruddy Farquharson's excellent 14.53 Triple Jump at Brisbane close behind with 87.10%. Despite not finding her world record breaking indoor form outdoors, Jenny Brown again ruled the female roost with a 1.60 High Jump at 42, worth 89.88%. Noelle Bradshaw was a worthy runnerup with her 3.45 Pole Vault which equated to 87.12% In the Throws.

Evaun Williams, despite not having things all her own way at Brisbane, achieved the impossible with a 41.81 Hammer Throw at 63 to score (wait for it) an unbelievable 106.19%. No wonder they are reviewing the age gradings! Four of the five best female percentages are attributed to Evaun with 94.31% for her best Shot Putt, 90.01% for her best Javelin and a mere 78.32% for her worst event the Discus. Only Esther Augee intervened with 79.12% for her 51.50 Hammer Throw at 37.

Malcolm Fenton moved into the M45 category with a 59.90 Hammer Throw which equated to 88.55%. Gordon Hickey was next with a 12.29 Shot Putt at 67 worth 87.47%.

The separate indoor best performance trophies will be awarded to Charlie Williams for his 8.52 60 metres at age 70 - which equates to 97.76% - and Jenny Brown's new High Jump world record of 1.69 which equates to 94.94%. Once again the unfortunate Val Parsons just misses out with 94.65% for her 8.6 60 metres, achieved when she was still only 54.

The final Trophy (and many feel the best), the magnificent "Norman Martin Trophy" for the best over-70 performance in the Club Championships also goes to Charlie Williams for his 27.4 200 metres which equates to 95.65%. It is significant that when this trophy was first competed for, we had very few members in this category. This year there was no less than 25 - they shoot horses, don't they?

ver a course effectively marked by what may have been the world's longest curtain remnant, Tommy Murray and Anne Keenan-Buckley graced the occasion with front running at its finest.



and BVAF 10km champion Allison Hirst.

By half-way Keenan-Buckley led by 50 seconds with an almighty battle taking place behind her as Porter matched Allen, the duo just two seconds ahead of Marshall heading for her third consecutive W45 title. McConnell and Hirst were by now slightly off the pace while coming into the picture was Patricia Affleck.

Majestically homing in for her third consecutive win in this event Keenan-Buckley hardly paused for breath before exclaiming, "That was a great course and tough in parts but then, that's cross country.

"Before the race I was con-

cerned about shin splint problems but I felt in great shape."

The W40s supplied the next two home as Allen had sufficient in hand to blunt the effect of a fast finishing Affleck whose mid race surge dealt with both Marshall and Porter.

"I didn't expect the M40 title let along finish second overall," said an elated Allen, "that was my kind of course and I felt strong."

Affleck, Flora London Marathon W40 winner in 1999, appeared to have overcome recent Achilles problems. "My only worry now is whether I get accepted for next year's marathon."

Karen Marshall ignored a

strapped ankle to clinch the W45 title while taking W50 honours was Falkirk's Janette Stevenson proving a 'Local Hero' as she finished 13th overall to brush aside the dual threat of Zina Marchant and Jane Davies.

The W55 honours went to Anne Roden who in spite of such strong opposition as BVAF 10km champion Val Hancock and Elaine Statham - twice winner of this event - came home well clear.

The men's event saw Tommy Murray attempt to take a leaf out of Keenan-Buckley's book as he charged away but the scenario differed as Julian Critchlow matched his pace.

Achilles problems ensured that Critchlow's challenge was short lived and by the mile point he shared second with Mick Hawkins as Murray went away by some ten seconds.

Half way saw Murray lead by 25 seconds as Hawkins edged clear of Critchlow while Colin Donnelly had eased his way into contention to run in tandem with Bill Foster.

Mike Boyle, who later admitted, "My racing legs have gone," had dropped behind both Steve Murdoch and the first M45 David Neill.

Murray proceeded to pull further away to the finish as Hawkins dropped the dogged Connelly to take second.

"The undulating course suited me," said Murray, a point proved when 45 minutes later he ran it again to win the Bank of Scotland open race!

Although crowned BVAF half marathon champion in June, a month after turning 40, Murray doesn't consider himself as a veteran. "I prefer to compete in open races," he admitted.

Hawkins, 40 two weeks ago, has a background of some 40 international appearances including European indoors and Commonwealth Games. His original mountain running background, which included a British championship, was, he admits, "Helpful over today's course with its ups and downs".

Another mountain running champion, Connelly, second two years ago, continued his consistency to improve on his fourth of last year as, according to Foster, "He got away with about a mile to go."

Neill brushed aside the after effects of a recently gashed hand to finish first M45 to slot between Murdoch and Boyle.

Graham Tuck BVAF M50 champion, was a clear winner in his category, finishing 26 seconds ahead of Wales' Owen Lewis and in the process saw him and his twin brother Grenville complete a remarkable set of team golds.

Thirty years ago, they won gold with England in the Junior International and both were later to win more gold in the Senior World Championships.

After an early dropout in last year's event, Graham Wootton made no mistake with a convincing M55 win. "I started steady and once ahead I took it easy and had plenty in hand at the finish."

Bob Toogood took advan-

tage of being a 'young' M60, having reached this status on October 17th, as he easily led home BVAF champion Fred Gibbs. "I wasn't sure of my position until Graham (Wootton) came up to me and said I was first M60. After that I relaxed."

Runaway M65 winner last year, Keith Spacie, had a tougher fight on his hands with five in contention half-a-mile from home. "I decided to clear off and was relieved to cross the line first."


As is the norm, England was dominant in annexing the bulk of the team titles with Ireland's W35 and Scotland's M45 successes putting paid to a clean sweep while Falkirk Victoria Harriers can take great credit for an event that was the centrepiece of their centenary celebrations.

UDGING by Martin Rees' recent form, if work commitments hadn't decreed otherwise, there might have been a different name on the leader board at the recent Veterans International, writes Pete Mulholland.

The latest exploit by the Swansea Harrier, who will be 49 in February, was 66:29 (his fastest for six years) in the inaugural Cheddar Half Marathon held on November 10th, the same day the veterans' cross country was held in Falkirk.

"I originally intended to compete for Wales in the International but what with a working week that entails four 12 hour shifts, there was no way I would have been able to travel to Scotland," says Rees, reflecting on an event that he won in 1993.

Only two weeks previously Rees had clocked 66:47 at the Stroud Half Marathon in a closely fought contest but, at Cheddar, it was solo from the word go.

"I ran the first mile in 5:04 and passed five in 25:05 and ten in 50:31 before finishing over six minutes clear of the next man home."

Currently the owner of three British M45 bests (5km in 14:51, 10km in 30:17 and 10 miles in 49:36) Rees admits that Bill Venus's Half Marathon mark of 65:42 "is a tough nut to crack."

Rees has a Marathon best of 2:23:17 set in Dublin, but each time he has tackled the distance subsequent serious injury problems have incurred a six or nine month lay-off so, currently, they are a no-go area.

"I didn't start running until I was almost 39 years old when a friend at work asked me to keep him company on a run," admits Rees whose training workload involves almost 100 miles a week. "Much of my training is done over parkland, I rarely go near a track, and it is mainly steady with three hard sessions each week."

Employed as a weighbridge operator at the Corus Steel works in Port Talbot, Rees training appears to have hit the right balance and as the man himself says, "The best is yet to come."

BVAF **MULTI EVENT** CHAMPIONSHIPS SHEFFIELD, 8/9th September

few black clouds threatened, the wind couldn't decide in which direction to blow, there was a distinct autumnal feel in the air but, *writes John Charlton*, nothing would dampen the spirits of the multi-eventers who assembled for the BVAF's 22nd Decathlon and 14th Heptathlon Championships.

A few years ago, I put out a rallying call to our women when entries for the Heptathlon fell as low as three. However, since that time, women's veteran multi-eventing has gone from strength to strength with notable successes at European and World level for Jenny Brown, Carol Filer and Hazel Barker. This makes it all the more remarkable that at Sheffield a record number of nine women contested the Heptathlon without the above three present.

The closest competition, and probably the most exciting finish of the weekend, came in the W55 Group between Pat Oakes and Jackie Charles. Before the 800m, Pat led by 96 points. Allowing for some margin of error, Pat had to keep within 11 seconds of Jackie and Jackie had to be at least 13 seconds ahead of Pat for either one to win.

Jackie just went for broke from the gun, never looking back; Pat simply hung on. It was a great race and in the end, with the gap held to just under 10 seconds, Pat won by a mere 18 points.

A similar situation developed later in the Decathlon but this time it was Ray Ashford, in second place coming up to the 1500m, last discipline, who ran a gutsy race in 4:53.51 to come through and win by 49 points from Hasam Hasap. It was Hasam's first BVAF Decathlon for which he had made a special trip from Cyprus to compete in Britain. Hasam led for the first 9 events and gave a good account, including making many new British friends. Terry Hall took Bronze.

In the M40s, Andrew Waddington led by more than 200 points at the end of the first day. However, the more experienced multi-eventers came through on the second day, which is often the case, and John Mayo, Kenneth Lyn and Brian Slaughter took Bronze, Silver and Gold respectively.

Mike Corden had to dig deep on the second day having damaged a calf muscle warming up for the hurdles. Mike made an attempt only at the hurdles, (in order to continue the competition) and then had to work hard at the remaining events to take Gold and stay ahead of Dave Cowiey (Silver) and Laurie Dunn (Bronze).

In the M55 group, Dan Luklinski led throughout the whole competition with Brian Loten putting in his usual solid performance but not quite able to close the gap. Derek Graves took Bronze.

In the M60, three stalwarts of multi-eventing took the stage but it was a revitalised John Howe who took all the accolades and the Gold medal. It was a great performance by John, particularly in view of his recent injury and health problems. It will be an interesting contest next year, when both athletes are at their absolute best, between him and John Ross who had his own injury problems on the day.

Colin Shafto just headed David Burton in a lively contest in the M65 age group and set a new British Record in the 100 metre Hurdles with an impressive 17.32 into a -2.6 headwind! David, still in considerable discomfort from a recent operation, did well to compete at all. Joe Phillips, in a welcome return to multi-events, took Bronze.

Norman Carter took Gold in the M70s and achieved his target of exceeding 5000 points by some margin [5167] on the age adjusted tables. In the M85s, Tony Rawlinson never ceases to amaze with his dedication and enthusiasm for the Decathlon. Not only did Tony set a M85 British Record in the Decathlon but, en route, set new British Age Records in the Long Jump, High Jump, Shot Put, Discus and Pole Vault.

Turning back to the women, Kay Koppel was also in record breaking form. erasing Betty Steadman's old mark and setting a new W65 Heptathlon record of 4516 points.

Nanette Cross (W60) and Sue Pickersgill (W40) took Golds in their respective age groups. Gill Dobson put in a solid performance across all seven disciplines to head Jacky Ricketts and take Gold in the W45s.

In the W35s, Christine Pates, who is already eagerly anticipating the Decathlon being accepted for women by the veterans/masters movement, took Gold ahead of Dorothy Orr.

had beaten John Browne....
it was an incredible feeling.... (I was) very emotional
when I crossed the line....
ecstatic is an understatement."

This is Eric Smart candidly describing winning the BVAF M45 100 at Eton last summer. An engaging personality, Smart added, "Browne had done 10.97 earlier in the season and that did scare me a bit".

However, Eric Smart really fears nobody which is his strong point. Winner of the M40 100 and 200 at the BVAF Championships in 1999, Eric went on to take fourth in the 100m and second in the 200m at the WAVA World Championship in Gateshead later that year. But he was surprised about the strength of veteran competition when he came into the movement through the North Eastern Vets.

"To be honest, I thought when I turned 40 I would dominate but it has not worked out that way."

Allen Wells, the 1980 Olympic 100m champion has been Eric's mentor. inspired my whole athletics career and brought it to the fore (although when) I saw him run last year it was sad because he still looks physically fit but the speed just wasn't there. I think I would beat him now."

Smart was a useful runner at school but with the only organised athletics being the annual School Sports he drifted into football, playing throughout his teenage years for a Sunday League team. In 1980 he turned semi-professional on the Scottish Games Circuit and competed for prize money until 1994.

"Basically the Scottish Games Association circuit holds annual 'Games' at different venues in the Borders - Jedburgh, Hawick, Selkirk, Peebles - and the Highland meetings. You can pick up a lot of prize money and I did this for 14 years. I won the Powderhall Sprint In 1988. This is the most prestigious (of the British professional races), the Blue Riband event, (its reputation reaches even) America and Australia."

Smart was given an 8 metre start In the Powderhall Sprint, a 110m handicap, and won in 10.83 - worth around 10.6 for 100m. In 1992, Smart tackled the British and Scottish Professional Championships at Langholm where he won the 90m in 10.04 on grass and, next day at the Scottish Professional championships, a wind assisted 100m in 10.45.

"I was quite fortunate to win some professional sprint titles. The pro circuit and the amateur circuit went open in 1994 so I turned 'amateur' for the first time at the age of 36. I ran for Wallsend Harriers for six years.

"The vets scene rekindled my enthusiasm. It has such a friendly atmosphere. My only burning question would be: if I did 10.45 at 36, what would I have done if someone had got hold of me at 18?"
