Secretary's Report

Our Annual General Meeting was held at 18.00 in the Alexander Stadium on the first day of our Track & Field Championships. The main item discussed was the changes to the Constitution needed before the formation of a Company Limited by Guarantee that the Vice-Chair, Ian Richards, has been discussing with all Clubs and is presently working on.

The Chairman reflected on another very successful year. Paul Dickenson did not wish to continue as President due to ill health feeling that he would not be able to make the commitment. Also stepping down were two great stalwarts of race walking, Eric Horwill and John Hall. I know you will join the Executive in thanking them for their huge contribution over many years and wish them well for the future.

The Chairman also referred to the research projects in which we have cooperated with University Departments, Birmingham University, King's College, London, and St. Georges Hospital in London that attracted considerable numbers of our athletes, to their benefit and to the advancement of medical sciences. Manchester Metropolitan University has produced a draft report booklet on its findings and asked us to review it and comment before the report is finalised.

The Hon. Secretary reported on the introduction of more stringent Data Protection Data in May and she and Walter Hill attended a Seminar on Governance in Sport at the London offices of the legal firm Moore Stephens in March. A copy of the brochure on Governance in Sport was requested by European Masters Athletics to use as a format. On the advice of our IT Manager, Peter Kennedy, we are now registered with the Information Commissioners Office (ICO) to benefit from their advice.

The European Masters send a Diploma to any European athlete who breaks a record and she is delighted to report that this past year was a particularly busy one as referred to by our Statistician below. Prolific record-breaker Angela Copson (MMAC) was awarded World Best Female Distance runner of the Year and European Masters Best Female Athlete Award.

She regretted that we have to report that one of our active members, David Burrell (EMAC) received a 4-year Anti Doping provisional suspension from 18 October 2017 until midnight on 17 October 2021. According to UK Anti-Doping he had "refused, without compelling justification, to submit to sample collection after notification of testing".

She thanked Clubs, Race Organisers and Volunteers who helped to promote our various Championships during the year and welcomed on to the Executive, Data Protection Professional Alex Rowe, NMAC, as our Information Processing Officer with responsibility for the demonstration of BMAF accountability for GDPR. She is indebted to our long serving Hon. Legal Adviser, Walter Nicholls for his advice and guidance.

The Hon. Treasurer, David Oxland, presented a comprehensive and healthy Balance Sheet. He thanked Peter Duhig for his help with recovering outstanding overseas fees. Maurice Doogan reported increased entries at the Indoor and Track & Field Championships and his worries on finding tracks suitable for holding some of our Championships. He also alluded to the shortage of Officials.

Maurice said we are going to organise our own Grade 1 Courses, so that we get our own Officials. The costs would be met by BMAF and he will be contacting the Clubs about holding these Training Courses in their local area.

Cross-Country Secretary, Mel James, reported increased team entries in the M35/M45 relays at Long Eaton and the very successful Cross-Country International hosted by our N. Ireland club, for which he thanked NIMAA and Rob Fox and his team at Long Eaton. The England Athletics Masters Association organised their second Inter-Area Cross Challenge at Bournemouth on the 25th November, a week after the International. It was won by SWVAC, with five Areas competing. Best aggregate performances were from older masters; Peter Giles (VAC) obtained an excellent 90.48 %, fresh from his England International performance where he narrowly lost out on a gold medal by one second. Penny Forse (SCVAC) produced an even higher 93.5% to win the women's aggregate.

Our Cross-Country Championship was held in Scotland, on the 17 March and the small town of Forres gave us a real Scottish welcome. Besides the BMAF contested medals, all the age group winners received a specially labelled whisky provided by the local Distillery, with every entrant also taking home a souvenir of local made shortbread. All the age groups were well contested, with some very close competition. The closest contest was in the women's 40+ age group, where only six seconds separated the first three finishers, Kerry Marchant (Staffs Moorland) obtained the gold medal finishing just two seconds ahead of Jennifer MacLean, (Edinburgh AC) with South London's Mary James taking the bronze.

Road Running Secretary, Walter Hill, reported on a full year of road and Multi-Terrain Championships. The marathon in Chester is shared with England Athletics. The project of raising the profile of Masters running by England Athletics has been a great success and he is delighted to record that the BMAF has been instrumental in that success. 232 entered the Vitality 1-mile in London in May; he hopes that it could be a BMAF 1-mile Championships next year. All other entries have been up. Ian Richards reported on Race Walking and performances at home and at the European Masters in Madrid and Alicante.

Our IT man, Peter Kennedy, had been very busy during the year. He is joined by Alex Rowe (NMAC) as the Assistant IT Manager, Information Processing Officer, and Gary Leek (SVHC) is now Communications Manager.

Peter said the following activities are a normal part of the IT

manager role: Management of Opentrack developments; maintenance of website fixtures, results, photos, records, contacts lists.

Management of all championship entries – production of competition files, UKA registration checks, liaison with race organisers/scorers. The introduction of new technology for instance, Smartphone time recording of races as supplement to paper recording when chip timing is not available. Refinement of scoring systems, such as ones for the Inter-Area Track & Field Championships and the new Inter-Area Cross-Country. Accounting of competition entries, membership payments, Masters Athletics subscriptions. Production of address lists for printed copies of Masters Athletics. OpenTrack user support, Area Club Membership Secretary support. Production of monthly statistics of BMAF Area Club membership.

Mass communication to members regarding their OpenTrack data, benefits available to members and details of future events according to their athletics interests.

With increased numbers entering BMAF events, the peak demand for help from the user support team just before competition entries close, has increased but he has had additional assistance this year from Alex Rowe, Courtney Gunn (EMAC) and Ada Stewart (SVHC) to cover this work – a busy man indeed! We thank Peter and his team for the excellent work they are doing as the BMAF system is now seen as a model.

According to our hardworking Statistician, Brian Owen, he ratify and successfully claim 60 British Records, 12 European and 6 World Records plus a further eight European Bests in the Road and Walks category during the year under review. In addition he produced a statistical survey that he hope will identify quickly those athletes who are likely to be awarded British, European and Word Best Masters awards. This should be possible shortly after this year's World Masters Championships.

Brian reported that he contacted many of the UKA top Officials and found them without exception more than willing to provide the necessary proof to substantiate the claimed performances. He also received a great deal of help from UKA top Official Malcolm Rogers and UKA's Statistician lan Hodge who digs out Photo-finish and ZCT's and Field Cards when asked.

The one area that he finds most difficult is the World Masters Athletics' Records Officer, who appears to take months to ratify World Records, whilst Europe only takes a couple of days and it is the same documentation. Brian mentioned that when he has spare time he does a bit of Announcing! Brian has also introduced British Record Certificates and said that by the thanks he receives from you, they appear to be well received by our members. What would we do without him?

Peter Duhig was also kept busy and had just finished processing Malaga entries. 372 entered the European Masters Indoor in Madrid and he felt that the 113 who entered the European Non-Stadia in Alicante, was lower than he expected. We have a record 704 entries for Malaga, 221 women and 483 men. Peter pleaded to you all to check your emails regularly when you enter an international Championship as emails are the main source of direct and

fast contact, he only makes general comments on social media; queries should be emailed to him.

THE 300 PLUS CLUB

The BMAF Executive have reluctantly decided to discontinue the 300 Plus Club. It was originally set up to allow members to provide additional financial support for "Masters Athletics", with the possibility of winning a cash prize. Without this support the Federation would probably have been unable to continue publishing as it would have been a significant drain on its resources.

Over the years the magazine has evolved and methods of funding it have moved on. It has reached a stage where the income raised is not sufficient to justify the efforts involved in running the club. However the subscriptions of all those who have paid up will be honoured. Since May no new subscriptions have been collected. There will continue to be monthly draws until May 2019, but the total of prize money distributed will be reduced.

Without their support "Masters Athletics" would probably not have survived and this vital means of keeping members informed would have been lost. We hope you feel that it has been worthwhile even if your number did not come up.

Masters Events Travel - looking ahead

With the recent record numbers of British athletes competing at the WMA Malaga 2018 event and the great success there the interest amongst the Masters Athletics community for attending events is at an all-time high. Whilst many competing athletes make independent arrangements the BMAF agent Track & Field Tours (T&FT) is working closely with future event organisers on some initiatives that will hopefully benefit those that travel to events either independently or as part of a package.

In the not so distant past athletes attending events would do so through their national federation and a higher proportion would take up the option of packages provided by the appointed agent of their national federation. In some countries such as Norway and Germany the national federation are still actively involved by making arrangements with the event organisers to direct their countrymen and women towards a selection of accommodation options in order to generate team spirit in "team hotels". As all host organising committees generally appoint a local agent to handle on-line booking requests from their own event website with a wide selection of options by narrowing down the options this provides a focus for individuals to enable them to feel a part of their national team not just at the track but where they are staying too.

For the federations that have done this and continue to be involved in co-ordinating this for their members in this way they are in a good position to forecast likely needs at future events based upon their historical data and hence be able to secure allotments for their likely projected numbers. This has not been the case in Britain for such a long time and so it is impossible for BMAF or their agent to have any sense of likely requirements for future events.



T&FT has been operating as the **MACI** BMAF appointed agent in years recent having **2019** established as a specialist MASTERS ATHLETICS athletics tour operator for ONSHIPS INDOOR almost 30 years and handles a

proportion of the British athletes that attend events -

generally those members that prefer one agent to be responsible for their complete booking and ensure that flights, airport transfers, accommodation and any other addon services are all co-ordinated. This is, of course, not what everyone requires and with on-line booking relatively easy to do for many, and with regular attendees at events often communicating with each through Social Media groups and forums, for many self-booking is all that is required with no assistance which is understood.

Currently, T&FT is taking bookings for the European Indoors in Torun in March 2019 with rooms secured with the organisers. T&FT is also co-ordinating with both



the organisers for the Venice 2019 European Masters Championships in Sept 2019 and also for the Toronto 2020 World Masters in advance of the official launch of bookings being open for these events in order to secure allotments of rooms for British athletes to create "Team GB accommodation options" In this way a more pro-active and less reactive approach is being initiated with the support of BMAF which will hopefully benefit those members that this idea appeals to.

Another initiative is to offer BMAF members the option of Championship event Add-On Tours at events which could be booked by even those that choose to attend the events independently. The venues for events are often in interesting locations and a good number of travellers will take the opportunity to extend their holiday independently but others might want to but as single travellers are not so sure how to do it or the costs are prohibitive and travelling alone is not that appealing. The aim is to offer group extension tours at the end of a championship that individuals or couples can book to share with fellow masters athletes. Most recently, 50+ clients booked an add-on tour to Poland, Slovakia & Vienna following the recent (non-Masters) Berlin 2018 European Championships at which 300 fans attended amongst these were regular Masters event travellers, and major event spectators too, Ros Tabor and Andrew Murray and commented that the experience with all of its inclusions was one that they thoroughly enjoyed sharing with other group members, having a great time and would never have managed to see so much by themselves.

The Venice 2019 event provides the opportunity of add-on tours, for example, to Verona, the Italian Lakes and Milan amongst other options and Toronto 2020 will have add-ons to Niagara Falls and other parts of Canada too. If adding another dimension to your competitive holidays is something that might interest you or your travelling partners then T&FT is planning to offer such a service.

Stay Cool in the Call Room - Phil Brennan

British Masters on top of the World in Malaga 71 year old runs a 57.26sec 400m!

Delivering his final instructions in a packed canvas tent pitched just outside the main stadium in Malaga on the eve of the biennial World Masters Athletics Track & Field Championships on 3 September, Meeting Director Alan Bell announced in his now internationally famous Geordie accent: "we will have 160 100m races in one day" as the Officials, Organisers, Volunteers and Team Managers twitched nervously in their seat. This is real; most of you will never have experienced anything like a World Masters Athletics Championships, there are over 8,000 competitors here, he continued. Bell is a top IAAF Official who knows the Spanish Officials and system well, assuring the Meeting that he had every confidence in their organisational ability. It is 28°C outside and climbing.

Meanwhile the long queue at Registration in the main hall was shortening and the young volunteers were still meeting, greeting, checking ID and directing athletes from some 102 countries to the Transport desk, Declaration etc. With hindsight that whole section could have been more efficiently set up. The infield was mowed and the resurfacing

of the 9-lane track completed, in this instance only by €600,000 being taken from the Organising Committee's funds as the City and the Mayor who had so enthusiastically welcomed the Championships, were not able to see a way to contribute a euro despite their awareness of the financial impact 8,000-plus competitors and an estimated 6,000 family/supporters/officials would have on their city over the two week period.

The tracks were fine, but the throwing circles were not up to standard nor were the run-ups to the jumps in some of the arenas. Some throwers complained that a circle had been painted over and was dangerously slippery. It is a World Championships and with increasing numbers and stronger competitors now entering these events, the throwers deserve the best facilities available even where that may mean travelling away from the main hub. Unfortunately Masters athletics is unfunded and left to manage its own affairs. We run the world's largest Track & Field meetings with committed people but without adequate facilities; recognition, the backing of National Governing Bodies and the same access and priority accorded to major IAAF Championships, we are being overwhelmed by our own success. World Masters Athletics President, Stan Perkins, said this was their most challenging Championships, four tracks owned by four different Authorities.

Visa issues

The tightening up on European immigration laws prevented some 200-plus athletes from entering Spain as they were refused a Visa. It was in many instances their error for leaving it to the last moment, but in several cases there were glaring inconsistencies by Embassies and High Commissions not accepting that older people can be active athletes! Say you are a tourist and they may have been okay. It culminated in athletes forfeiting their entry fees, flights and accommodation costs. Solitary lessons for us post Brexit from 2020 onwards.

Five Gibraltarian athletes were also caught up in political shenanigans. We understand most of them live and work on the mainland and compete for Spanish clubs. Just hours before the Opening Ceremony, outgoing WMA President Australian Stan Perkins, and WMA Officers were summoned to a meeting with senior Officers from Real Federación Española de Athletismo who were under orders to see that the flag of Gibraltar was not displayed or recognised and that these athletes compete as Spanish, or cancel the Championships. Despite Gibraltar AAA, the IAAF's and Lord Coe's support for the right of the athletes to run in their country's colours and agreement to allow them to wear a neutral vest, four of them withdrew. The fifth athlete, who got through to the M40 800m semi, is no stranger to controversy as he confronted the Spanish authorities at a major international in Seville in the Nineties and there was also an incident in Valencia just recently during an IAAF event. A sad day indeed when older athletes from all over the world who come together to compete, renew friendships and who wish to live an active and healthy life, are targeted for political purposes.

The hammer cage in Torremolinos took a bit of a hammering from a strong cross-wind on the first day and the crosscountry course on the second day, also in Torremolinos, was in the opinion of Team Manager Archie Jenkins, a true crosscountry test, hilly, stony, dry loose sandy soil, loved by the strong Kenyan team and the European mountain runners, or considered dangerous by many. There were several fallers as the bright sunshine coming through the forest canopy made protruding tree roots, rocks etc. difficult to spot. A German competitor suffered minor concussion and under the new Health & Safety Rules had to be taken to hospital. The following race was delayed whilst a replacement ambulance arrived. Lack of lap counters in the first race resulted in some confusion. The Anti Doping squad also made an appearance and pulled in a random few. Otherwise, it was a great day's racing in tropical conditions, well organised with on-course water stations and good local facilities.

Our team of 704 athletes is the largest sports team ever to leave these shores, stretching in age from those who reached the magic 35 in the week before, to our elderly Statesman 93-year old Dalbir Singh Deol, and coming home with a barrow-load of medals, numerous PBs, Season's Best galore and as shown elsewhere in this issue, British, European and World records. Our Records team at home had been kept very, very busy indeed, for which we thank Brian, Bruce and everyone involved.

There were inevitably some hiccups, but problems were swiftly addressed by the small committed Organising Committee, most of who are active runners. Wrong age category on some bibs, 42 hammer throwers were left waiting by the cage instead of being kept in the Call Room. Some throwers and high jumpers complained their performance was affected by the poor surface and was it necessary to bring medallist back to the main stadium for their presentation in a separate tent?

However, most of our members have every reason to conclude their season on a high note. VAC's Gavin Stephens hit PBs at age 41 in both the 200m (22.81sec) when finishing 3rd behind Dominic Bradley and had a terrific series of 400m races culminating in him running the legs off former Commonwealth Games Champion Mark Mutai, who also ran in the Kenya 4 x 400m at the IAAF World Championships in Daegu. Mutai won the second of nine heats in 50.91sec; took his semi in 50.19sec just ahead of David Brown (50.60sec) and looked set to take the final. Gavin was clearly enjoying the 28-32°C conditions in contrast to rain-soaked Aarhus where he finished outside the medals. Lining up for the final, the Spaniard Ricardo Gonzalez was the only sub 50sec qualifier on the blocks but it was Gavin who got it on the line to become World M40 champion in 49.68sec from Gonzalez, 49.76 and Mutai had to settle for the bronze medal in 50.07sec, David Brown was a good 4th 50.53sec. Coventry Coach and WMA IT man, Stewart Marshall, had a great victory in the M35 400 from Rick Beardsell. Rick had a remarkably good Championship as he now moves up to M40 next season having won medals at all major Indoor and Outdoor Championships. We had a clean sweep in the W60 race when Caroline Powell led Joylyn Saunders-Mullen and Caroline Marler home, and in the M55 race won by Jonathan

Tilt from John Wright and Simon Bickers. Stephen Peters set a M65 European Record and said he has actually run faster in training, and W70 Angela Copson got her penultimate of 7 gold medals, also in a record time.

It is not unusual to find parents and their siblings competing in these Championships and a high profile father and son appeared in the BMAF strip in the sprints here. John Browne has been a long time member of our sprint and relay squad, now his son Jonathan is proving a chip off the old block as he ducked under 11 sec to split the Americans Rondrick Parker (10.85) and Terrance Rowland (10.90) for the silver medal in the M35 100m (10.87). Dad settled for 6th behind Stephen Peters in his M65 race and did not appear for his 200m heat. Jonathan turned the tables on Parker and Burnett in the 200m winning the World M35 title in 21.95sec to add to the family's considerable trophy cabinet.

One of many making their first appearance in international Masters competition was Sale Harrier Lucy Evans, who held her form well to wrestle the W35 100m title from a determined defending Debeh Erawati, as the USA based Indonesian Olympic hurdles semi finalist was not going to relinquish her crown without a fight. Lucy went on to take the 200 even more decisively later. With such a huge entry, 1154 in total in the 100m, running heats, semis and finals in glorious weather, the sprinters got value for money. The One False Start Rule does not apply in Masters Athletic Championships.

Fiona de Mauny (SCVAC) recorded her second fastest ever 800m in taking the World Masters W35 title in 2.10.24sec; her fastest 400m when finishing 4^{th} and got a silver in the 1500m. With heats and semis and a run in the $4 \times 400m$, she was a busy lady as was the ubiquitous at these events, Adrian Haines.

Evergreen Martin Ford was one of many from our South West Club who had a memorable Championship as Club colleagues Kathryn Bailey, Carole Derrien, Janet Dickenson, Jan Ellacott, Jane Horder, Caroline Powell, Martyn Morant, John Shapland, Emma Stepto and Neil Tunstall to name but a few, all came home loaded despite being without stalwarts like Simon Anderson and Ed Shillabeer.

BMAF W35 title holder, Jodie Albrow, was delighted with her silver in the Heptathlon although the Judy Vernon coached SCVAC member's 4327pts was down on her Sheffield score. Jodie Ward finished 6th. Janet Dickinson (SWVAC) also got silver in the W50 and 16 women tackled the W55 Heptathlon with Charmaine Johnston 4th, Gaye Clarke, 5th Jillian Rogeniski 6th and Christine Pates 12th in a close competition and it is the first time I have known Carole Filer not to finish her multi event.

One of our athletes had not done a Decathlon since moving up an age group and unfortunately did not put down a score when entering. Had he done so, it is highly likely his score would have taken him into Pool A. He found he was in Pool B that started much earlier and despite Team Management's

efforts the previous evening to try to get him moved, the system cannot be changed and with over 40 men in some age categories, this has to be accepted. In such circumstances you are allowed to compete Under Protest, but you must start in the Pool you were in. M45 Darren Scott (NMAC) lost points in the shot; otherwise his 4th place was a very meritorious effort. There were two new World scores, the M50 Decathlon won in a World Record score of 8,068pts by Germany's Thomas Stewens and the M85 Canadian, Ted Rowan, scored over 7,110pts. Brian Slaughter medalled again, this time silver and Alan Leiper unfortunately only completed three events.

The 10km is now held on the road and at 09.00 under an overcast sky the Kenyans filled three of the first four places. Nick Jones 15th Simon Baines 19th and Paul Thompson 36th were well up in the huge field. Alastair Walker, Paul Mingay and Jon Cross filled the first three M60 places and Martin Ford won the M75 race. Kenyan women also dominated, Kathryn Bailey got another W50 gold. Angela Copson had a four minute victory! The half marathon on the final day, with the Kenyans featuring again in the M40/45 race, resulted in a haul of individual and team medals. Karl Welborn was the leading Briton.

Zoltan Fabian, Hungary, threw the M45 hammer out to 65.15m despite the conditions, European still dominated this event and M65 Guy Dirkin came oh so close to taking the title throwing 45.37m to Poland's A Piaczkowski's 45.44m.

Two interested spectators spotted in the Carranque stadium on 11th watching the exciting 800m finals and the M50/65 pole vault was Mike Bull and former UKA President, Lyn Davies. They would have seen Mark Johnson tie for M50 gold (4.25m) with the Spaniard Hernandez, Glyn Price and Emerson Obiena from the Philippines also tie for bronze and David Gordon get 8th. Three had failed to clear their opening height – what a competition! They would also have seen Alan Williams and David Blunt take 6th and 7th in a field that no doubt had some familiar faces. They may have been mesmerised at the winning times of the 800m. Angela Copson obliterating the W70 field, W65 Alison Bourgeois's decisive win, Virginia Mitchell, Yvonne Crilly and Christine Anthony race to a W55 clean sweep, M40 Shropshire lad Charlie Thurstan, M50 Adrian Haines and M35 Aaron Brown fight to split seconds verdicts and Janet Smith get a medal in the W50 weight throw. There were some scintillating 400 heats and 800 finals.

Over at the University track, Joanne Frost came back from bronze medal position with her penultimate jump to take 2nd (5.45m) as Germany's Sandra Kramer's second attempt clearance of 5.72m gave her victory. The M40 title went to James Beckford, Jamaica, 6.94m.

Down in Torremolinos, Paula Williams' throw of 38. 65m for 3rd in the W45 javelin would have got her the silver in the W40 group. The Finn, Harri Hakkarained, got the M45 with a 60.89m throw and the M35 event was won in 67.21m by Bjorn Lange, Germany. Devotees of this discipline headed for the main stadium on 12th to see four times Olympian Roald Bradstock lead the M55 Group A, sending the spear soaring

out to 61.72m for victory. It was his first appearance at these Championships as up to 2012 the Florida-based Painter dubbed "the Olympic Picasso" was still seriously challenging for a place on the British Olympic team, missing out on London 2012 only by cms.

Another British Olympian raking in the gold medals was BMAF Vice-Chair, Ian Richards, as he cleaned up the M70 track and road walks in World Record times, taking the 10km by over four minutes. The host nation, with its long history, dominated the team awards as the hosting of the Championships aroused interest from many retired former top international Walkers. They could have done with more lap counters however, but Peter Duhig was there to ensure our Walkers were correctly counted. Despite little shade on the course, heat and humidity, and very strong opposition, the British Walkers had a great Championships boosted by the inclusion of the M35 King twins and the return to international competition of now mother of four, Lisa Kehler. All road runs and walks finished in the main stadium.

How does one describe Angela Copson? The Rugby & Northampton runner remains undefeated year after year, still breaking records and not just winning, but winning by huge margins. She entered seven events; cleaned up from 400-5km on the track, won the two road races and ran in a relay. She picked up her Best Female Athlete Award to much applause at the European Council meeting.

We read reports of Charlie Allie's 100/200/400 M70 record times in the States but few could ever imagine the 71-year old Teacher from Pittsburgh racing down the back straight at such speed to stop the clock at 57.26sec in his heat. Unimaginable that an over 70 could have such speed and stamina. He went on to take the final in 58.67sec on a muggy day. "I could have made the 1968/72 Olympics but I concentrated on my University studies and earning a living. I did compete at a high level and kept running, I raced against John Carlos, Tommie Smith (of Black Power fame), Jim Hines, Charlie Green and several others, we were really strong then.", he explained after his final, but I sure would love to race all those guys now, he laughed.

Going quietly and determinedly through the M45 100/200m rounds was a sprinter who deserved an award just for his sheer courage. As SCVAC member, Jason Carty, stepped up on the victory rostrum for the first of his three gold medals, the relief and emotion that must have run through his mind, is unimaginable, for here we had a fit young man who less than two years ago, was told he had a life threatening illness, he was to sacrifice a lung to cancer. He had now just won the M45 100m World title in 11.01sec, the second time he had set a new British Record. His winning time in heat 10, and his semi were the fastest. He had seen off the World largest entry and best Masters sprinters. He went on to take the 200m from a 91-strong field. On the final day, he was moved down to run in the M40 4 x 100m with Mensah Elliott, Tam Ossai and Domenic Bradley, going on to win by a huge margin in 42.56sec. Jason is no stranger to winning, as prior to his illness he had collected several individual and team medals. A few months earlier he had teamed up with

Domenic, Mensah and Dwaine Chambers to break the M45 4 x 100m World Record. We bow to you.

The 1500m finals on the last day were tactical; Guy Bracken got the M50 title in 4.30.10sec Mike Tees 6, Rob Andrews 8th and Anthony Roper 13th all getting through. British Masters M45 champion, Mark Symes, sprinted to victory from Dean Richardson in a classy international M45 final, he moves up an age category this autumn and had just missed out in 4th in his 800m. Zoe Doyle just lost out to Ireland's Kelly Neely in the W40 race.

The number of countries entering teams in the relays was a record in itself and we finished out of the medals for the first time in some age categories, but it is great fun and gives sprinters a second bite at the cherry. The W60 quartet, Hilary West, Helen Godsell, Jane Horder and Caroline Powell took three seconds off the British 4 x 400m record.

The complete results are still available on **www.malaga2018.com** and were instantly flashed around the world on social media.

WMA holds its biennial General Assembly on the rest day, unfortunately for the athletes it was the only wet day. Stan Perkins had come to the end of his term, Margit Jungmann, Germany, was elected and she becomes the first female President of the world governing body. The position of Women's Representative has been abolished to be replaced

by a new Women's Commission. The 2020 Organising Committee from Toronto, led by Doug "Shaggy" Smith and Paul Osland, both active runners, updated the Assembly on progress. Throwers will be very well catered for as they have wisely drafted in a separate Group with that remit, the throwing facilities looked very good. There is also plenty of accommodation. After Torun next March, Edmonton will host the 2022 Indoor.

Report on the World Masters Championships in Malaga by BMAF Chairman Arthur Kimber

COMPETITION HIGHLIGHTS

A magnificent performance by the British team of 704 athletes topped the medals table with 80 gold, 66 silver, and 57 bronze beating hosts Spain in to second place with Germany third, USA fourth and Australia fifth.

The outstanding British athlete was W70 Angela Copson, winning seven gold medals and one bronze. She narrowly won the 400m. in 77.47, the 800m. by 13 seconds in 2:54.63, the 1500m. by 30 seconds in 5:48.03, the 5000m. by almost two minutes in 22:08.19, the 10k. road by nearly four minutes in 45:38 and the 6k. cross country by two minutes. She took her final gold in the 4x400m. relay and the bronze in the 4x100m. relay.

Other notable performances came from W80 Evaun Williams with world records in the shot, 10.07, hammer, 35.16 and weight pentathlon, 6080 points. She added a British record in the javelin, 26.06. A further world record was set by M70 race walker and BMAF vice chairman Ian Richards in the 5000m. in 25:51.34, followed by two victories in the 10k. in 54:08 and 20k. in 1:55:00. W65 Joylyn Saunders-Mullins set a European record of 69.79 in the 400m. Seven athletes and one team set British records in winning their events. Steve Peters, M65, in the 200m, 24.84 and 400m, 59.09, M45 Jason Carty, 11.01, in the 100m, W45 Yvette Henry, a 12.59 100m, Jonathan Tilt, M55, 400m. hurdles in 59.80, Alex Swiecicki, M70, a 2000m. steeplechase mark of 8:54.27, Lisa Kehler, W50, a 20k. race walk time of 1:51:45 and the 4x400m. W60 squad of Caroline Powell, Hillary West, Helen Godsell and Jane Horder , 4:41:85.

FACILITIES NEWS

Three stadia were well connected by the Metro system leaving athletes only a very short walk, Metro journeys were free and there were special shuttle buses to the fourth venue at Torremolinos. Most events ran well to time.

But the four stadia were underused, with no competition going on for considerable periods of time outside the afternoon siesta break. Road races started and finished on the track in the main stadium and road starts and finishes just outside the stadium would have freed the stadium for other competition. Warm up areas were not all suitable, only an indoor strip at the main stadium and a football pitch at one other stadium that was used by footballers while athletes were warming up!

Travel on the service buses required a payment of 1.30 euro, for any journey throughout Malaga, admittedly cheap, but over two weeks could mount up to a considerable sum, and unfortunately Malaga traffic was often heavy and held up by roadworks required for the extension of the Metro! Refreshment facilities varied from a very good café at one stadium to very sparse provision at the others. Fortunately near the main stadium there was an independent, not connected to World Masters, café across the road.

The cross country course with some exposed tree roots, loose stones and tight bends led to some athletes falling and the throws and jumps areas were not ideal, with insufficient implements, rough concrete circles and hard packed rather than soft sand.

Many athletes were very pleased with their Malaga experience but World Masters and the Local Organising Committee let down others, who had spent considerable sums on entry fees, travel and accommodation, and were expecting a higher standard at a world championship.

GB Medal Winners in Malaga

"Run, Ingrid, Run" - Ingrid Sells - SCVAC W45 100m

Follow up to Ingrid's article in the Summer issue of Masters Athletics which documented her return to athletics and her preparation for her first major championship....

Sat on my derrière (or should that be "culo") trying to extract any Spanish words buried in my hazy school days memory bank in an attempt to converse with the Colombian athlete, who I'd found myself next to during a gap in my pre warm-up phase, was one of a bunch of memorable moments that made up a most unforgettable trip of a lifetime to compete in the World Masters Athletics championship in Malaga, Spain 2018. Then turning around and chatting, as if we were long-time friends or training buddies, with an American decathlete who gave me some encouraging words to prepare for the race I was about to run.

The room truly had an international flavour. Athletes from all around the world from Albania to Zimbabwe, Iceland to Australia. It was amazing and lovely to see some of these athletes I'd recognised from the opening ceremony which had taken place two evenings prior, on night 1, at the Malaga Automobile Museum. Ladies in striking red and green Mexican dress; colourful flamboyant Brazilian women and even someone in a Kangaroo costume who must have hopped all the way from Australia! A gathering of nations and kindred spirits, there to pronounce the games open and to swear their allegiances to the Constitution of the Games.



I made a mad dash to the main Stadium after the ceremony had finished to receive my athletes pack. The queue was surprisingly short, and I collected the all-important packed with my precious bib number, which when I opened my pack was number 3333 - I hoped that in some culture somewhere that the number 3 was lucky and it would bestow a sprinkling of luck on me. I took the opportunity of having a sneak peek at the track and the warm up area including the 'ominous' call room. I'd been fortunate enough to come out to Malaga in April earlier in the year and had previously viewed the track and warm up area, so I was delighted to see the newly laid, now blue, track and the familiar downstairs indoor warm-up lanes. Locating and demystifying the call room,

which was the 30-minute holding pen for athletes immediately before each race, was helpful in settling my nerves. I spoke to the supervising staff too, so I was fully comfortable with the environment.

I returned to the main Stadium on Day 2, the day before my race, to watch some of the events at the track and to meet the GB massage therapy team and take their advice as to whether to have a treatment prior to my competition. I decided to go ahead and use up one of my massage sessions. The therapist assessed and treated me, and we decided to strap my ankle as I had been having issues with my peroneal tendon. The queues for athlete registration were, by now, extremely long, so I was glad I'd managed to do this on day one. I decided to take things easy on those two days prior to my race, so did some food shopping for snacks to eat on race day as well as relax on the sundeck at our hotel.

My parents and partner, Paul, had come out to Malaga with me to support me in my race, so it was nice to have some family time with them. My Mum swam, and we played cards in the sun - it really was an enjoyable time - combining competitive running and a holiday and I do urge anyone, who has thought of giving it a go, to do it if they can.



On race day, I was queuing at the computers to find out what heat and lane I'd be running in. One computer didn't seem to be displaying the page that I needed so I waited behind a different computer and got chatting to a lady in the new queue. We exchanged the usual pleasantries: names, countries we represented, race we were competing in and we both said than 100m. Then we asked the usually taboo subject of what age we were, but given the environment, this subject was allowed and celebrated - we both said age 45 category. We started laughing about our coincidences. It was her second World Masters Athletics competition, as she'd competed in Australia, and it was my first. The computer became free, so we gathered around to find the information and saw that she was running in Heat 2 and so was I. Then we spotted that we were in the lanes next to each other - this was getting spooky. I asked her if she was going to do the next World Masters Athletics competition in September 2020 in Canada and that it would be funny if we were racing next to each other then, but she said that she probably wouldn't be there as it was very expensive to travel from where she was from. It seems such a shame that money gets in the way of someone doing something they enjoyed and was good at and we'd not see each other at that competition. It would be ideal if there was a level playing field but, I guess, it would be difficult to create. We wished

each other the best of luck and said goodbye and see you later so we could both carry on with our pre-race warm up schedule.

My usual warm up routine takes me about 1 hour and a quarter but, as I wasn't quite sure how much extra time to allow for uncertainties, I started my warm up 2 to 3 hours in advance of the race time and took things slowly to begin with. My physical warm up felt good; previously, back at home, I quite often found my body wasn't balanced when I jogged and my legs and abductors had been tight and I sometimes couldn't pick up my pace; but the lead up period of rest and the massage treatments I'd had must have done me good, as I felt fine and was warming up well. This meant I was ready to race at least an hour or so before I was supposed to. I tried to keep myself moving for that last hour but, I guess it comes with competitive experience to know how much warm up to do and not overdo it and the timing of such, so this is something I know I must work on as it's not all about the actual race. We had to be at the call room on time to be checked in by the officials. I gathered my warm up suitcase (which was crammed full of all my contingent supplies from safety pins to spare clothing, foam roller to hot muscle rub and snacks to toilet rolls) I must have looked like a street trader!

My friends from Cambridge Harriers had hotfooted it over from their venues to surprise me by the call room to wish me good luck and to offer encouraging words - it was uplifting. They then went upstairs to the spectator area, so they could shout out support me in the race. My parents and Paul were in the crowd as well. Paul came down to see me about 1 hour before I raced and told me where they were seated so I could find them after the race.

The ladies in my heat and I were checked into the empty call room and I put my suitcase into the nearby secure section. We were ushered to our seating area and the 30-minute quiet psychological countdown began. Some of us were stood up and doing last minute limbering up exercises whilst others sat still in anticipation. There was one other GB athlete in my heat and I knew she was faster than I was. The athlete I had met at the computers earlier was in the area too. With about 15 minutes to go still in the call room we were called to line up in our lane number order. My nerves stepped up again, but I was still a lot calmer than I thought I was going to be. A video I had watched before I came out to Malaga had helped me put competition procedures and mindset into perspective and it had obviously been beneficial.

We were then frogmarched out towards the track and a spontaneous round of applause broke out for us as we went past the athletes who were in the adjacent band of seats waiting for the next heat. I must have been so 'in the zone' as I didn't even recall seeing them come in to the call room. We were halted at the entrance onto the track and asked if we all wanted blocks or not. I was one of 3 athletes who were not going to use blocks. We were then led onto the track and we instinctively went into our lanes. Whilst my blocks were being removed I looked up at the crowd and located my family - I spotted my Dad. He was 'overhead' waving at me and I copied him and 'overhead' waved back, and we did it again so we both knew we could see each other - it felt emotional - I then remembered I was there to race -

I'd almost forgotten! My blocks had gone so I did a short sprint start and walked back as did the others. I didn't think there was enough time for a second warm up start, so I stood in my lane and looked ready, staring down my lane to the finish. "On your marks" - I walked forward to the start of my destiny. I made myself comfortable in my crouch 4-point start position. I slightly adjusted my feet but was conscious that the next command could come at any time - I kept still then "Set". I rose up, took a deep breath in, waiting for the gun. There was a short wait then I heard the gunshot- it was time to race. I went into automatic pilot. I felt I started well. I was focused on myself, but I saw that I was keeping up with the others in the drive phase. I kept going but I could see that the other athletes were pulling away from me. I did expect this as their declared best performance times were faster than mine. I just kept running as if no end was in sight. I was getting near to the finish line and I could see that several other ladies had already crossed the finish line. I carried on so that I could cross the finish line and complete my race. I felt fantastic, elated and happy. I'd done it. I wanted to race some more. It was a real buzz.

We congratulated each other and there were smiles all round. We all gathered by the finish line where several photographers and a videographer were taking shots. I joined the line-up, struck a pose (similar to my fancy ballroom dancing-days pose) and then we saw our times and positions flash up on the clock. I came last and my time was 18.51 (wind -3.1) which was around my current times, so I was pleased with my performance. Then we went back to the call room to collect our belongings, and now that our race was over, we were chattier and were analysing our race with each other. There was a good atmosphere.



We took photos on our mobiles for posterity. I took a photo with the athlete I'd met in the computer queue and with the winner of our heat, who was one of the other GB ladies, and who later went on to be the ultimate winner in the final of our category.

Once I'd stretched and had my therapeutic 'after-race massage' I went up to see my family and it was lovely to hear how proud they were of me and to know they were supporting me. My friends from Cambridge Harriers had watched me race but they had to get back to their events and other venues, but they sent me congratulatory text messages. The whole event was so friendly and supportive - it was so enjoyable.

My race was done. There were mixed blessings as I didn't make it into the semi-final, but I could now relax and enjoy the achievement of my lifelong dream and we could savour the last couple of days of our trip. We decided to have a celebratory meal back at the hotel that night and we toasted my success.

The following day it was my turn to be supporter. I got up early to go to Carranque Stadium where my coach, Barry Ferguson, was running his semi-final of 300m M75 hurdles. I met up with my friends from Cambridge Harriers who were also there in support and we watched Barry in his event. I don't know what possesses anyone to jump over those high hurdles, so I was in awe of him and the other competitors. Barry also competed in the 80m M75 hurdles and later went on to win the event.

I left the championship on the Friday, day 5, so I received the news of Barry's win via message and I saw the photos of his medal ceremony. It was fantastic and heart-warming to see.

Our last couple of days were spent relaxing and wandering around Malaga as well as a quick trip back to the main stadium, where I'd run my dream the previous day. I purchased some photo mementos of my race to treasure for a long time.



Malaga is such a lovely place to go to. We revisited the beach, the small shops, tapas bars and restaurants in the old town. We saw the majestic Castle, the lovely architectural buildings, the unexpected Roman amphitheatre, the bustling plazas, the pretty Botanical Gardens by the marina and the gorgeous marina itself, where we celebrated with the obligatory cerveza and a couple of melon mojitos!

It was then time to catch our late Friday afternoon flight home under sadness that the bucket list competition and trip had come to an end. Regrettably, the timing of our trip had meant that I missed the athletes party on that Friday night but, there was my new goal for next time: to be at the athlete's party in Canada 2020. By then, I would have practiced my warm-up schedule even more, learnt how to use the block start, increased my power in the drive phase and gained more stamina for the final stage. I hope to get my time down to the mid-teens, if possible, and to be in with a shout at the 'semis'. I'll have moved up to the next age category then, so it will be a great achievement to look forward to in my 50th year.

I also have my sights on the European Masters in Venice, September 2019, so I might start planning my "Italian Job" in the next month as I'm sure that will be just as fantastic a trip.
